REV. MGR. BURKE HERE.—Lieut. Colonel Right Rev. Monsignor Burke, Chief of the Catholic Chaplains of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, arrived in Charlottetown yesterday from a visit to English and Alberton and leaves this morning for Ottawa. He will return to the front in the course of a few weeks. Mgr. Burke during the eighteen months he has been in Europe has visited all the camps in England and France and has gone as far as Gallipoli. When along the Somme Front, he met at Courcellette Major Jenkins of this city. Travelling as he did from camp to camp he had an opportunity of seeing quite a number of Island soldiers. He spoke of meeting Colonel Ings and the men of the 105th, when they were at Caesar's Camp, Shorncliffe. Mgr. Burke has now under his charge fifty-five Roman Catholic Chaplains. The total number of Chaplains, of all denominations, with the Canadian forces, is two hundred and fifty.

SUCCESSFUL FUNCTION.—The annual High Tea and Bazaar held in the pro-Cathedral yesterday afternoon and evening (and which will be continued today) under the auspices of St. Joseph's Sodality proved, as usual, a splendid success. A delightful substantial menu was served by obliging and attentive waitresses to a large and appreciative crowd. The tea tables were set in the centre of the large auditorium and were encircled by strikingly attractive sale booths which were laden with stationery, novelties and fancy needle work. The booths received generous patronage. A most pleasing feature of the function, and one which added greatly to the entertainment, was the music furnished by the Fourth Regiment Band. Children will be admitted free this afternoon from three to five o'clock.

TO MEET FOX MEN.—Mr. Chester McLure, Manager of the Fur Sales Board, goes to Summerside this morning to meet the fox breeders in that vicinity. The fox breeders of Summerside will have a large number of pelts to market, and it was from this centre last season that the Fur Sales Board received their greatest support. It is to be hoped that the fox breeders of Summerside will contribute all their pelts to the Fur Sales Board, as their collection will materially add to the high class of pelts. Last season some of the highest prices obtained by the Sales Board were for fox pelts taken from the ranches at Summerside.

HOME ON FURLOUGH.—Private Thomas M. King, of the 239th Overseas Railroad Construction Battalion, now mobilized at Windsor, N. S., arrived in the City on Tuesday night to spend a short furlough with his family living here, before leaving for Europe. Mr. King was formerly an officer on the Car ferry steamer but latterly has been making trips with horse transports to Europe. He made three trips in all. On the first of these on the S. S. Cassara, the ship had the experience of being chased for four hours by the Irish Sea by an enemy submarine. On the last trip there were detained three days in the danger zone and needless to say there was a certain amount of anxiety about it. Mr. King is the only man from P. E. Island in the 239th Railroad Construction Battalion. The Battalion at present has a strength of some nine hundred men, practically all from Western Canada. Private King leaves on return to Windsor on Saturday morning.

LOADING PRODUCE.—There are eight schooners loading produce at the Charlottetown Railway Wharf, and two at the Steam Navigation wharf. At the Railway wharf the schooner Howard, Captain Murray, is being loaded by Mr. Byron N. Barnes, for Halifax, with 7,000 bushels of potatoes and 2,000 bushels of oats. The topsail schooner Fortin is loading 6,500 bushels of potatoes for a United States port, presumably Boston or Gloucester. The schooner "Marguerite" is loading 7,000 bushels of potatoes for Pictou and the Mary F. Fleming, Capt. Silver of Lunenburg, is loading 4,600 bushels of potatoes for Boston. The Clayton W. Wallace, Capt. Standish Wallace, has finished loading a cargo of 4,000 bushels of potatoes and 6,000 bushels of turnips for Lunenburg, N. S. The Clara Hamilton has finished loading 2,000 bushels of oats for Sydney and the schooner Ellen Mary, Capt. Olsen yesterday completed loading 4,000 bushels of potatoes for Halifax wharf. The above-named vessels are at the Railway wharf. The schooner Assurance at Pickard's wharf is being loaded with 7,000 bushels of potatoes for New York.
