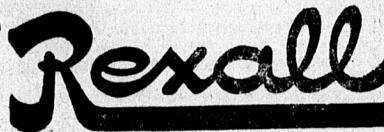

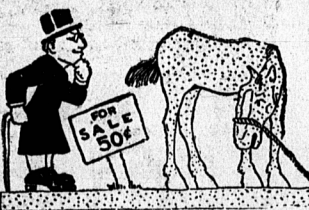

THE MINTO.—The Minto docked in Pictou Saturday afternoon at 10.25 a. m. with 60 tons freight, 10 sacks mail and 18 passengers.

BOAT SPECIALS.—The mail special from Cape Traverse arrived in Charlottetown Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock and left again on return at 8.45 last evening. The special from the Stanley at Georgetown reached the city at 1.50 p.m. and at 8.45 last evening left Charlottetown on return to Georgetown.

THE MAILS.—Six iceboats left Cape Tormentine at 7.20 Saturday morning, with 70 bags of mail and one passenger, and arrived at Cape Traverse at 11.20, the mail special reaching the city at 1 o'clock. The boats left Cape Traverse at 7.50, with 50 bags of mail, and arrived at Cape Tormentine at 9. The Nova Scotia mail arrived in the city at 1.50 p.m.

ADVANCE OF PRICES.—Receipts of live cattle and hogs at Toronto markets since 1st January are fully 25 per cent greater than a year ago. Choice Butcher cattle are quoted from 6 1/2 to 7 1/2 live weight. Packers have been paying for live hogs 8.25 of cars. The demand for cured meats is good and prices have been advanced.

FARMERS' MEETING.—Mr. Richard Creed will address an Agricultural Conference at Uigg on Tuesday evening next, February 16th. PLANT LINE STEAMERS.—An Ellis Halifax exchange says: Captain and seven men of the crew of Plant liner A. W. Perry left Halifax yesterday for Boston, where they will join the Plant liner Evangeline which has been chartered for Southern waters. The Evangeline has been anchored in Boston harbor for some time. The A. W. Perry, which is now at Halifax, will continue on the regular service between this port and Boston. Captain Hawes has command of this steamer.
