THE ROYAL ARCANUM.

Brooklyn Members May Ask Injunction Against The New Rates, New Order Talked Of.

New York, Sept. 18.—A meeting of a general committee representing the subordinate councils of the Royal Arcanum of Brooklyn and Long Island was held tonight in Brooklyn. A resolution was adopted protesting against the failure of the supreme council to recognize the new schedule of rates. It was also decided that the councils represented by the committee should not recede from their position and that measures should be taken to reorganize the order so that 90 per cent of the governing body would be made up of representatives from the subordinate councils instead of as at present constituted.

The committee also decided during the coming week to take some legal action in the courts of Brooklyn, probably in the form of an injunction, against the supreme council and directing it to show cause why the council should not be enjoined from putting the new schedule of rates into effect on Dec. 1. It was announced that next Tuesday evening a meeting of all the representatives of the eastern and middle states councils would be held for the purpose of discussing the feasibility of establishing a new order as proposed on a previous occasion in Massachusetts.
