## Dominion Income Tax Returns

This year the Dominion Government has imposed very heavy penalties upon persons sending in incorrect returns.

For instance:—If the income is understated up to one-tenth the real income the fine is 10 per cent interest on the deficiency.

If understated by more than 10 per cent but less than 20 per cent the fine is HALF THE AMOUNT OF INCOME OMITTED.

If the deficiency is 20 per cent or more, THE WHOLE OF THE UNREPORTED INCOME IS TAKEN.

A false statement may be punished with a \$10,000.00 fine and six months in jail.

If late in sending in return 25 per cent is added to tax.

You must not wait till asked for tax, nor leave the calculation of its amount to Government officials. You must ask for proper form.

All returns must be in by April 30th next, accompanied by at least one-fourth of actual tax reckoned liable for.

Take no chances. Your return must be perfectly accurate to avoid HEAVY PENALTIES. Do not delay. Attend to this important matter at once.

—NURS. IS GRADUATION.—The nurses graduation of the Prince County Hospital will take place on Thursday evening next, April 14th. An interesting programme is being prepared which will include numerous readings by Editor Nash of the Charlottetown Patriot.

—A RAW "DEAL".—The door of one of the card rooms in Summerside was barred with a heavy plank early Sunday and caused great excitement and consternation among the tinner, poker flegs, a passer-by hearing sounds as if of someone in desperate straits within came to the rescue and the prisoner of hope again realized the joy of freedom.

—NEW COLD STORAGE.—Prospects for the erection of a cold storage plant in Summerside are becoming brighter every day according to those who have the project in hand. The new plant for whom it will chiefly be built are enthusiastic and the necessity for the plant is fully realized. With in a few days a definite announcement may be forthcoming.

—BAD ACCIDENT IN SUMMERSIDE.—While P. G. Gallant and his staff of men were engaged Saturday morning in taking down the stocks, the Bedeque ferry boat, King Albert, Mr. Ernest Gaudet, who was giving a helping hand, was struck on the head with a part of a broken block, which was used to haul the boat off. Mr. Gaudet was removed to the Prince County Hospital, and the last report is that he is resting well.

## Rickard Not to Visit Montreal

Promoter Will Not Give Montreal Offer Any Consideration at Present Time.

MONTREAL, April 9.—That promoter Tex Rickard will not visit Montreal today as was arranged early in the week, was announced last night by John Keary, legal adviser for the Graham syndicate. There are perhaps two reasons for Rickard not coming to Montreal. The first is that he has play-granted James Crankshaw yesterday afternoon permitting Crankshaw's counsel to examine Rickard as a witness in a suit filed by Crankshaw against the Graham Syndicate for \$400 for professional services. Had Rickard come to Montreal he might have been detained and the examination might have upset his plans.

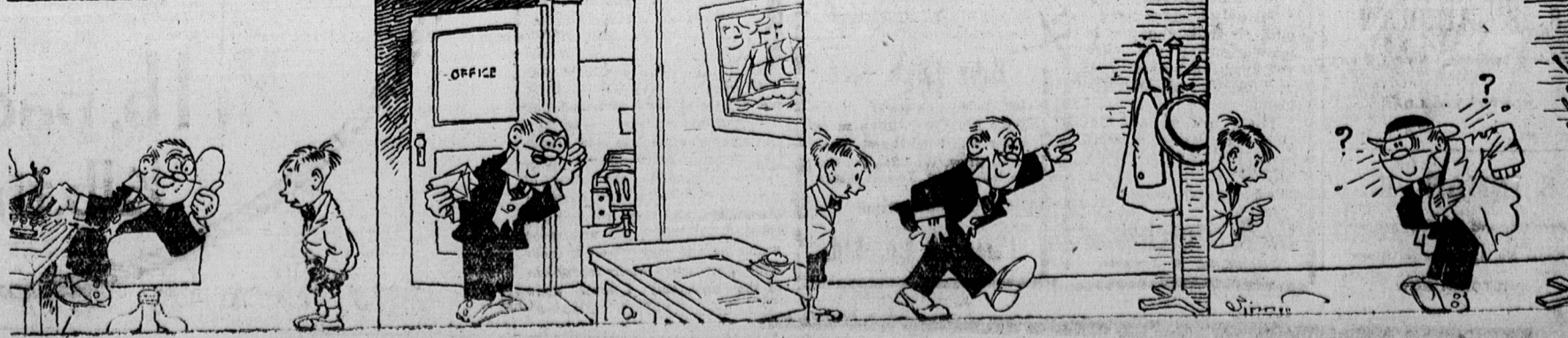

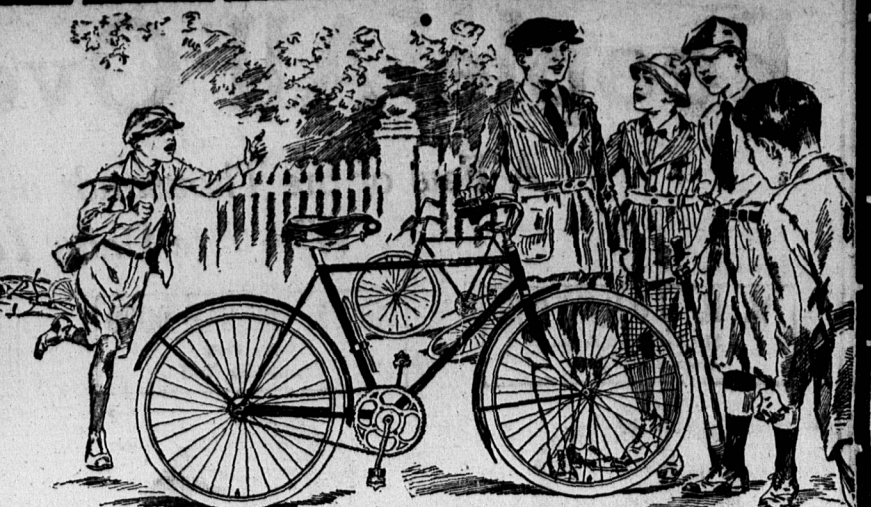
