THE SPY SYSTEM.

An effort is being made to arouse public feeling against persons who secretly obtain information against those who sell liquor illegally. It may be worth while to examine this subject a little.

Why should the man who sees daily an evasion of the law, an evasion which is open and notorious, such as the sale of liquor on Sundays or after hours, and to prevent which the duly constituted authorities make no move—

we have such a condition of affairs in Montreal—why should such a man endeavoring to secure the observance of such a law be classed as a spy and an informer in the most contemptuous and degrading application of the terms, particularly when his acts are dictated solely by a desire to further the observance of the law and by no ulterior motive?

There are in Canada, unfortunately, a large number of persons who violate the revenue law. The customs department keeps constantly in its employ a number of officials at high salaries with a share in the value of the seizures they make added for the detection of these offences.

On the Government railways and all the company railways, detectives are employed to watch from time to time the conduct of the conductors and train hands. For that matter almost every city employs one or more detectives whose business it is to ferret out crimes and misdemeanors of every kind.

But the customs, or railway, or city detective is not quite so tender toward the law-breakers as our prohibition prosecutors have been. They do not first give the offender warning, telling him he has been violating the law and urging him to do better. They do not say to him, "You will be watched, and if caught again you must take the consequences."

On the contrary, swift justice follows the first instance of the detection. In the light of these well-known facts it is not absurd to denounce, with opprobrious epithets, the man who secretly obtains information to convict a rumrunner? The ways of the lawless are always secret, whether they be smugglers, defaulting officials or violators of the liquor laws.

We would be glad that all such would quit their their unlawful practices. But it is not very manly for them to "come the baby act," and cry out about "informers" simply because they are caught.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY.

It seems not improbable that the introduction of the wireless system may effect a revolution in the world's news service. Mr. Marconi expresses his belief that his system will yet give press messages across the Atlantic at the rate of one cent a word.

The capital cost of installing the wireless system is only about one-twenty-fifth part of the cost of a cable and its appliances. If the cables can transmit for 12 cents a word, and it is alleged they can do so at a profit, it will be seen that with the lessened first cost of the wireless system a one cent rate would probably pay as well as the proposed 12 cent cable rate, even if the cost of operating were in both cases about the same.

The great cost of a cable across the Atlantic involves an interest charge of nearly \$1,000 for each working day. The wireless system escapes nine-tenths of this great handicap. The prime reason why cable rates are so high is that existing cables could not carry the business that would offer at a low rate. With a reduced rate more cables would be laid to do the business that will offer, unless the wireless system takes much of it off their hands.

With the prospect of greatly reduced transatlantic rates there will be no longer an excuse for the Canadian newspapers not having an Associated Press Atlantic service of their own, instead of having nearly all their British and European news filtered through American hands as at present and colored to suit tastes that are often anti-British.

TOO MANY BEN DAVIS.

OTAWA, Dec. 31.—Mr. McKinnon, chief of the fruit division of the department of agriculture, writing from England says that the market is being swamped by the Ben Davis variety of apples. He advises Canadian growers to stop planting this variety.

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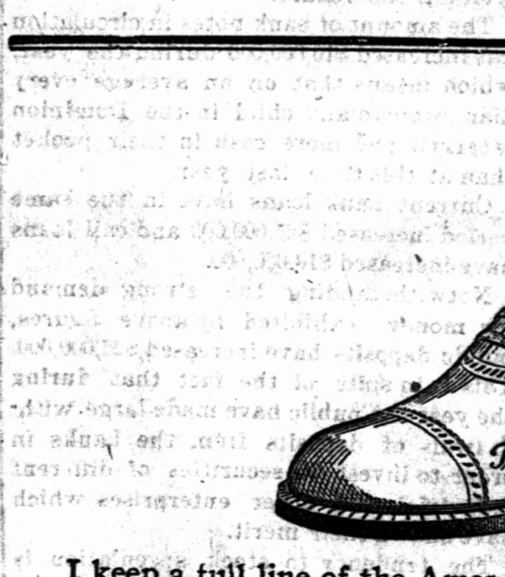
