That fox farming bids fair to be a lucrative and important industry in Cape Breton in the future, may be gathered from the fact that already, as previously noted Whycoomagh has a large and thriving farm, the property of Dr. Donald T. MacPhail of New York. Another farm about to be started, the fencing and other construction of which has within the past few weeks been completed, and which will even exceed in size the above mentioned one, is also at Whycoomagh, owned jointly by Dr. Donald T. MacPhail's brothers, J. A. MacPhail, well-known contractor and builder of Calgary, Alta, and Dr. Garfield MacPhail of New York. The new farm started under the most favorable auspices, two prize black foxes having last week been purchased by Contractor J. A. and Dr. MacPhail from a P. E. I. dealer, for a sum said to be in the vicinity of \$14,000. In a private letter received by a local fur broker from a P. E. I. farmer, the latter stated that he had endeavored to purchase two valuable black female foxes from the celebrated Dutton, Ontario farm, but had been informed by the latter that these foxes had a week previously been secured through an option by Contractor J. A. MacPhail of Calgary. Few, if any farms have been started under more favorable prospects, than the new farm at Whycoomagh. It has only been within very recent years that the experiment of breeding these valuable fur bearing animals was tried. That the effort has proved eminently successful is shown by the fact that there are several farms at the present time operating in P. E. I., three in Nova Scotia, including the two Whycoomagh farms, and one in Northern Ontario.—North Sydney Exe.
