PASTOR'S FAREWELL

Rev. W. J. Howard Leaves Pownal.

HIS PARTING ADDRESS

Short Review of the Work for the Past Three Years.

Yesterday morning Rev. W. J. Howard, who has ministered for the past three years to the Methodist Congregation at Pownal, preached his farewell sermon and will go to Alberton during the present week. During his pastorate at Pownal, Mr. Howard has endeared himself to his congregation and his removal from this part of the province will be learned with regret.

In preaching his farewell he based his remarks on Acts 20: 27. "For I have not shunned to declare unto you all the counsel of God." Three years ago, lacking three days, he preached his introductory sermon at Pownal. At that time he outlined his course and said that in ministering to the needs of the flock committed to his care, he would preach the truth and nothing but the truth. He said that in doing that he knew that some would get offended, but if they did get offended they should not acquaint their brother of their grievance. In taking his farewell he felt that he had fulfilled the course outlined on the first day of his pastorate. As a minister of Christ he had not shunned his duty and had endeavored to fulfil the words of the text "I have not shunned, etc."

During the days of his pastorate he had met with the people of the congregation in the hour of trouble, in the hour of trial, and in the hour of temptation. The tender associations of those hours had created strong ties which made the farewell a milestone in the chain of his ministry. In parting he reminded them of the danger that surrounds each soul, and their duty to one another. The true conception of Christianity is to cheer and strengthen each other for life's onerous duties and to hold out to them the hopes of the blessed reward of the hereafter.

He then referred at length to St. Paul's farewell and defined the relation of a pastor to his flock as that of a shepherd to a flock. Some members of the flock require meat, some sweets. The shepherd's duty is to study and to know what is best for each member. His duty is to also protect the flock against wolves from within and the wolves that assail from without. In all these things he "Had not shunned to declare the full counsel of God."

In reviewing the three years work he said that \$1,400 had been raised for all purposes or a yearly average of \$1,460. He had preached 510 sermons and conducted services for 17 weeks besides all prayer meetings and other social services. He made 1500 pastoral visits and received into the church on trial 44 persons, of these 20 into full communion and 24 remain probationers. In the three years he solemnized 16 marriages and officiated at 22 funerals.

In the field are four Sunday Schools with their business meetings, five Trustee Boards with annual meetings, some of which had five or six meetings in one year, five meetings in the Quarterly Board, and all the other various duties in connection with the church. In all work he had the loyal backing moral and material of many Godly people in his congregation. In conclusion he thanked the members of the Quarterly Board, the Recording Steward and the different Boards, and all contributors to the different phases of church work especially for

THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

From Ex-Prosecutor Henderson.

Sir:—On reading the reports of the fourth regular meeting of the Summerside Town Council held on Monday the 9th inst. I was surprised to see the reasons given by the Mayor for my dismissal. As he mentioned two specific charges, I wish to state the facts that the public may judge for itself. The first is that on Dominion day I rescued and shielded a man arrested by the other policeman and charges me with insincerity as a Scott Act prosecutor claiming I did not try to use this man as evidence against the seller of the liquor, which charge is absolutely false. The second charge is that through my alleged inefficiency the revenue of the Town was being wasted and the Town was already in debt to the extent of \$200 or \$300. The first four months of the year I was not employed by the Town, yet not one dollar was secured.

Since I commenced my work as prosecutor under the C. T. Act the 2nd of May the total cost for prosecutions was \$28.50. Against this was one fine of \$50.00 leaving a balance in favor of the C. T. A. of \$21.50. Even if the additional salary of \$25 for my first month as prosecutor be charged, there is still a balance in favor of the Act. Since the meeting, another fine of \$100 has been imposed in favor of the Act. Thus not one cent of the revenue of the Town has been used, unless, as Mayor Campbell hints, the town properly forms a joint-stock company with the rum business and is therefore legally entitled to a share of the profits, say \$1,000, or \$2,000, per year. I am not surprised that the Mayor should vote for my dismissal in view of his attitude towards me; but I am surprised that the Chief Magistrate of Summerside, a lay Prophet in the Kirk, should give as his reasons for so doing a statement which contains such misrepresentations of facts. Thanking you for space in your valuable paper I am, yours truly.
