## IN MEMORIAM

### MR. DUNCAN MACDONALD

In the timely passing of the late Duncan MacLeod, it sadly reminds us, that another span of life, has reached its end. He had touched the shores of eternity, another patient and honorable landmark has been removed from our midst. On Friday morning March 6, 1936, while the tide of his life was too full for sound and foam, that clear call came, and that which drew from out the boundless deep returned again home. For him the duties of life had all been nobly done; while surrounded by kindred, and by friends, death came as an angel of mercy to grant him release. Life for him had its spring, summer and autumn. "The falling leaf that tells of autumn's death is, in a subtle sense, a prophecy of spring."

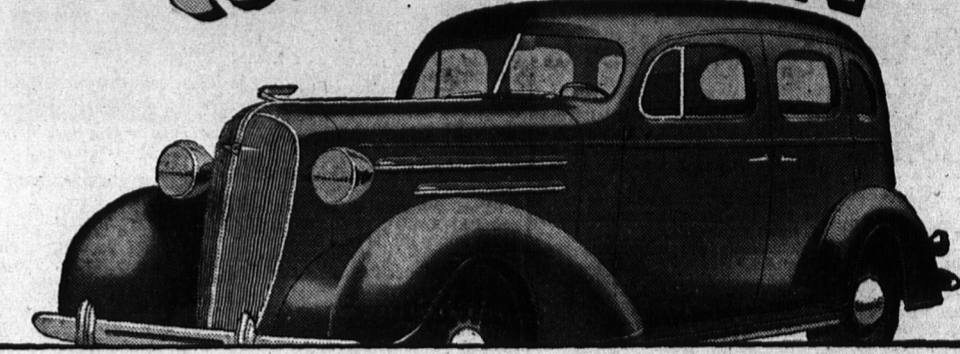
The late Mr. MacLeod was born in Belfast, 96 years ago; in early childhood his parents moved to Dundas, where he had permanently lived until his retirement in 1930. Since that time he had resided at St. Peter's Bay. He was the fourth son of John, and Sarah MacLeod, who in the early days emigrated from the Isles of Rassey (or Rassy), and Skye, Scotland. He was the last survivor in a family of seven. Originating from sturdy pioneer stock, as he did, in mind and body he

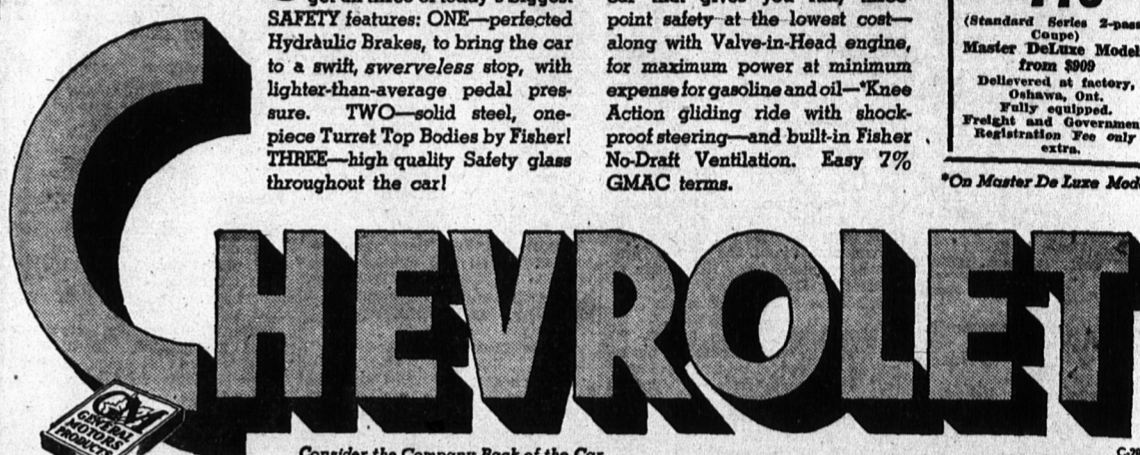

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reflected his noble heritage. He belonged to no sect nor creed, truth being frank, candid, and sincere he practiced what he preached. He was ever dauntless in his convictions and never feared to stand alone. He believed that character, honor, and truth, was a heritage more precious than coffers filled with minted gold. His home was an asylum for the wayfarer and none ever turned hungry from his door. His native congeniality was mingled with a sense of wit. He was not faultless, "but we write his faults upon the sands, behold the sand is dry, but we can find no fault written there."

The large company of friends, neighbors and loved ones, who had gathered to pay their last fond farewells, showed how highly the deceased was esteemed. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Aiken, B. A. A long procession accompanied the body to its final resting place, and interment took place in Dundas Cemetery. It is not death to die, "God gave to His beloved sleep."

He leaves an aged widow to mourn her loss, a gracious helpmate of more than sixty-five years. His issue is as follows: John L. of St. Peter's; James L. of O'Leary, P. E. I.; Daniel M., Robert F., Wallace F., Wycliffe S., Mrs. Iva W. Martin all of Brookline, Mass., and the Reverend Walter of Los Angeles, California. He also leaves thirteen grandchildren, and one great grandchild.

### MRS. FLORA BUCHANAN

Mrs. Flora McDonald, widow of the late Alexander Buchanan, who predeceased her about 20 years ago, departed this life on the 29th day of February, 1936. She was born on the Island of Skye, Scotland, on the 31st day of October, 1839. Two years later she emigrated to this Island with her parents, the late Donald McDonald and Mary Gilie, his wife, who settled in the section now known as Thistle and Shamrock. She was the eldest and last surviving of a family of nine. In the year 1858 another shipload of emigrants arrived on this Island. Among the number was Alexander Buchanan. In the record book of the congregation we read this entry: Married after one publication of bans by the Rev. Donald Morrison, Alexander Buchanan and Flora McDonald, Jan. 6, 1861. Strathallan, P. E. Island. Shortly after their marriage they settled on the farm in Broadbalk, on which they lived all their married lives and on which their son Donald now lives, and who with his wife cared for his parents in their declining years.

Although she had attained to the advanced age of 96 years and four months she retained her cheerful disposition until the end, also all her mental faculties. She was a woman who could converse and kept interested in all the topics of the day. She was well versed in sacred and secular history. Until the infirmities of age came upon her she was the first in the district around her to be called in cases of sickness and was always willing at any hour of the day or night to answer the call of those in need of

help. Her home was always open to the wayfarer who always found a shelter under her roof. She was a woman of strong faith as could be seen by those who visited her in her last illness. She could look into the future with the assurance that the Lord would do all things well and if it was His will to call her she was willing to go.

She had a most retentive memory and delighted to recall the sayings and doings of past generations. To meet her was a source of great encouragement. Her Bible was her constant companion and her faith she rested on its precious promises. She was industrious in the home where a spirit of peace and happiness prevailed. Early in life she united with the Presbyterian Church and followed her Church into union in 1925. She was confined to her bed the last three months of her life and passed over without much suffering. Her end was peace.

Besides a large concourse of friends who will mourn her passing she leaves to mourn of her own family the following: Donald and Malcolm A. in Broadbalk; John Alex in Michigan; George Duncan in Alberta; Mrs. Hubert Reeves, Freetown; Mrs. William Bots, Norwood, Mass.; and Mrs. Tom Costello, Brookline, Mass., also 18 grandchildren and 29 great grandchildren. Her funeral, which was held on the 3rd day of March, was largely attended, the services at the house and grave were conducted by her pastor, the Rev. Arthur R. Wallis who gave a comforting message from the words in Chronicles 29:28: He died in a good old age full of days, riches and honor. The pall bearers were her two friends from Hopedale, Messrs Alex and Dan McDonald and four nephews, Messrs. Angus R. McDonald; George Mayhew; Allan Nicholson; John J. Matheson. Her remains were laid to rest beside her husband in the Springtime Cemetery.

Mr. and Mrs. James E. Finlayson were recent visitors in town, Mrs. Finlayson remaining in for several weeks.

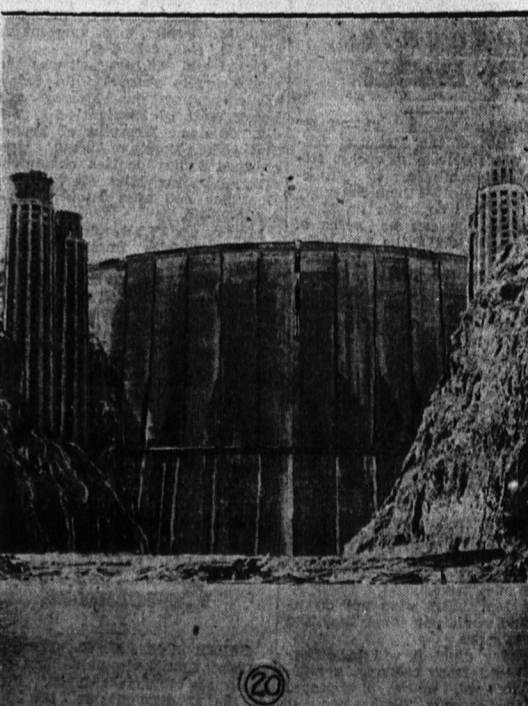
