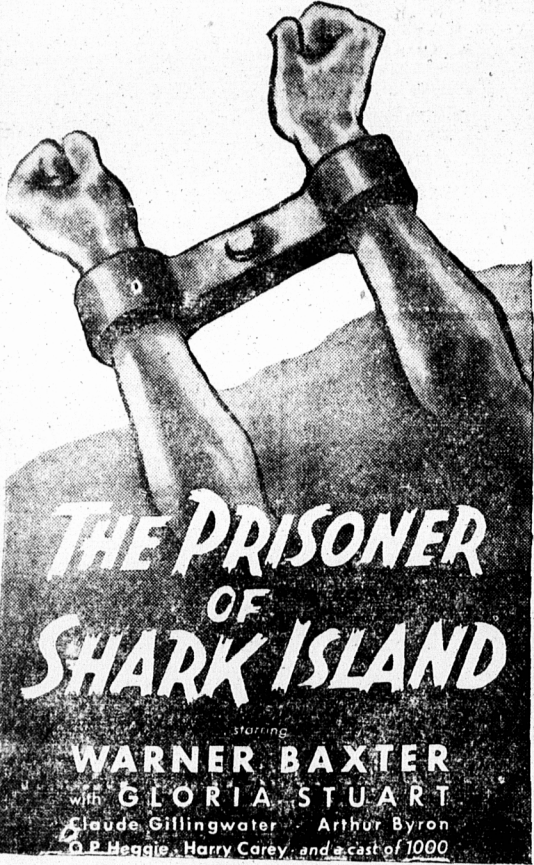

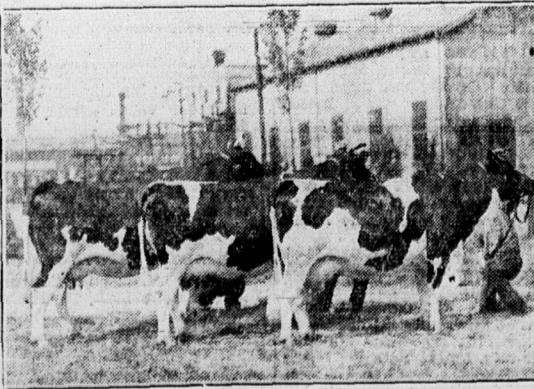

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. ANNIE MACLEOD

A tribute to the late Mrs. Annie MacLeod, who died at her home in Vernon River on August 29th. The late Mrs. MacLeod was born at Springton in 1842, the daughter of Donald MacKinnon and Christine MacLean. She might be said to be one of the early pioneers who in her youth was well acquainted with the toil and hardships of the early settlers an acquaintance with which seemed to bring out the better traits of character. In her early life she attended the Springton Grammar school and in later years often recalled various little incidents that happened during her school life long ago. At the age of sixteen she moved with her parents to New London. Later was married to Donald MacLeod who preceded her forty-four years ago. Although old in years, yet she was never content to grow old for she always seemed young and loved the companionship of young people even better than those who have long since passed the days of their youth.
