P.E.I. Approved Flock Association Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Approved Flock Association was held on Friday, June 28, in the Council Chamber of the City Building at 1:30 p.m. with about fifty members in attendance.

The President, Mr. Ernest Dagg, in his opening remarks, extended a welcome to Mr. F. M. Nash on his return and, in reviewing the progress of the P.E.I. poultry industry, stressed the need of co-operation of all concerned if we were to forge ahead.

The next matter on the agenda was the reading of the minutes of the last Annual Meeting and the financial statements of the Approved Flock Association and P. E. I. Flock Association by Mr. F. M. Nash which were adopted as read.

Election of Officers Election of officers for the ensuing year was next carried out: Directors: Prince County Mr. Lloyd Burns, P. E. I. Mr. W. P. Cameron, P. E. I. Mr. W. R. Shaw, East Baitic; Mr. Colin Dixon, East Baitic.

P. males in agreement with Mr. MacDonnell on this subject.

Mr. W. R. Shaw warned poultrymen against complacency in the matter of pullover disease control and urged that the P. E. I. poultry industry be organized to give attention to every possible detail.

Mr. J. H. MacPhail next spoke giving a short account of his recent visit to Toronto. He also spoke in favour of placing high quality R. O. P. males with our poultry flocks but felt that the R. O. P. males should be used with caution of the opinion that all R. O. P. males should be with flocks by November 1st.

If these were available he suggested that the P. E. I. poultry industry be organized to give attention to every possible detail.

Phone Operators Have Busy Task At This Season

Handling 300 to 400 phone calls an hour is the unenviable and almost unrelievable task these days of the 18 girl operators on duty at the massive switchboard of the Charlottetown Branch of the Island Telephone Company.

The post-war telephone traffic has so increased that the Company has asked for the co-operation of the public in meeting the situation and have patience with their employees for any slight delays which may occur.

Seated before a honey-combed, round-long table, the girl operators, amidst a maze of wires, throw in the connections after a moment's pause. On each position there are multiple jack numbers corresponding to telephone numbers in the area. The girl operator is required to know or read at sight the numbers on an some 4,000 board.

While 12 girls are busily engaged with the incoming calls there are six girls on the toll board who attend to some 725 outside calls per day.

Miss Mildred Naugler of the General Traffic Department, Halifax, is engaged in training new operators to relieve the present pressure. Miss Naugler, who has been in the city since June and has had considerable experience in her job remarked in relation to the number of phone calls yesterday during the brief period that she has never seen anything like it.

The summer months are regarded as the busiest season of the year, and this year has been no exception. The calls on occasions have been almost overwhelming. —Montreal Courier (reprinted).

Watching the operators, on the switchboard, quietly and efficiently carry out their fatiguing duties is enlightening in being done to give the public efficient service. Occasionally a harassed operator will be heard to exclaim "down" but on the whole "calm" are patient and, according to the girls, understanding.
