**British Extend National Savings**

LONDON, Dec. 5 — (C. P.) — British thrift is increasingly becoming a national virtue, as indicated by figures given by Walter F. R. Wood, President of the Board of Trade, in connection with the National Savings Movement.

"The total wealth of small investors in various types of investment at a conservative estimate," he said, "reaches the stupendous figure of 2,832,250,000 (approximately \$4,166,250,000). What with this National Saving Movement and all that pertains to it, there is very little doubt that we need have no fear as to this country being swept away on a wave of Bolshevism."

Lord Mottistone, Chairman of the Movement, stated that the increase in the amount standing to the credit of depositors in the Post Office and Trustee Savings Banks and to investors in National Savings Certificates and in Government Stocks purchased through the Savings Banks during the last three years, in spite of the financial crisis, was more than 1-2 times the increase during the previous three years.

**Hair Cut Tabbo On Sabbath Day**

LONDON, Dec. 5 — (C. P.) — Prosecution under the Hairdressers' and Barbers' Sunday Closing Act, which came into force in 1911, was taken in Surrey for the first time, when a barber named Reginald Gould was prosecuted at Chertsey for having cut hair on Sunday.

When the prosecutor informed the magistrate that the action against the barber was taken under the act which did not allow barbers to cut hair on Sunday the magistrate asked: "Does anybody know why?"

The prosecutor replied: "I cannot give the reason, but it is not lawful for any person to carry on the business of hairdressing on a Sunday." The defendant said he was only obliging one or two customers and received no financial gain. He pointed out to the magistrate that he had offered to gain and the summons was dismissed on payment of four shillings cost.

**New Perth Notes And Comments**

Owing to the early winter the boys are flooding the skating rink. Last year no ice could be made before Jan. 20th.

After a year of activity in community interests our Women's Institute held its annual meeting a short time ago. The following slate of officers was elected for the coming year: President, Mrs. J. A. Dewar; Vice President, Mrs. Martha Corcoran; Secretary Treasurer, Miss Annie MacPherson.

New Perth has produced some men noted for vitality and longevity. Some time ago a list of those over eighty years was published. In the past year the ranks were broken by the demise of two sturdy citizens, Misses Moore and John McNeill. A number of veterans remain conspicuous among whom is Robert Shaw, who is in his 99th year and who is still quite bright and alert.

Five young ladies from this school are attending Prince of Wales College during the present term, namely the Misses Ala Hamilton, Mary MacPherson, Mary Slavin, Flora Martin and Reta Corcoran.

Your correspondent calls attention to the statement printed that Stanley Bridge factory is the oldest co-operative dairy plant in the Dominion. It is a matter of general knowledge that the first of this type was erected at New Perth in 1892. The few factories that existed previous to this date were privately owned and Stanley Bridge factory was not one of them. The factory that functions there at present has reflected credit on that thriving community.

Your Montague correspondent in reporting Professor Lloyd Shaw's lecture in that town, makes the following statement: "He is of Mount Allison University, he has a wonderful command of English, he was born at Brudenell. In the interests of accuracy we may say that Prof. Shaw is Professor of Pedagogy at Prince of Wales College. He was born at New Perth which may in part account for his mastery of correct English. Brudenell is however a very good place to be born. Some of our most thrifty farmers and stockmen live there, and the locality has long been the theme of history and romance. New Perth, which adjoins it, has a distinguished educational background. We can count at least eight teachers of New Perth who have taught at the Brudenell School. Our school is doing well under the tutelage of Miss Annie MacPherson.

In the past season our fertile soil has responded nobly to the labors of the husbandman, giving us good crops of all kinds, all of which was well harvested with the exception of turnips, which will be to some extent damaged by frost. The farmer was not "caught napping." The potatoes remained green so long, coupled with the extremely wet weather, left digging late, and harvesting was thrown into November with its attendant risks. If at all possible, all harvesting operations should be completed by Halloween. Trade is dull and prices are below the profit mark. In other words, some of our cars would be loaded at our siding. Up to the present only two cars of turnips have been loaded by the enterprising merchant Mr. Harold MacLeod of Vernon River. Luckily we have a diversified system of farming.

Though the price of butter fat is low our factory will operate for the winter under the capable management of Mr. Hiram Lane.
