MINUTES OF THE PRESBYTERY

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in St. James' Hall, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, August 3rd, at ten o'clock in the afternoon, and was constituted by the Moderator pro tempore. John Gillis, with whom were present J. W. McKenzie, W. H. Spencer, George E. Ross, E. Smith, Geo. MacLennan, John Hawley, A. J. McNeil, John Stirling, D. B. Macdonald, A. Craise, ministers; T. C. James and Isaac Jay, elders. The minutes of meetings held on May 11th and 12th, 1909, were read and sustained.

E. J. Rattie was elected Moderator for the ensuing six months. Revs W. H. McEwen and W. M. Field, being present, were invited to sit and correspond.

J. W. McKenzie and John Stirling were appointed by the Moderator to examine the session records of St. James', Charlottetown. John Hawley reported that he moderated in a call at Mt. Stewart, on Tuesday, the 27th day of July, 1909, that the call came out unanimously in favor of R. P. Murray, Truro, N. S., that it was signed by 188 communicants and 113 adherents, and that it was accompanied with a guarantee of \$850 stipend, with use of manse. On motion, the conduct of the Moderator was approved. Erasmus Coffin, Isaac Jay and Hamilton D. Coffin, commissioners from Mt. Stewart and W. St. Peter's, testified to the unanimity of the congregation in this matter. Presbytery then sustained the call as a regular Gospel call, and instructed the clerk to forward the same to Mr. Murray. The following provisional arrangements were made for the induction of Mr. Murray, with the Church at Mt. Stewart, upon a date and at an hour to be fixed by the clerk, the Moderator of Presbytery to preside and conduct John Stirling to preach, John Hawley to address the minister, and George E. Ross the people. Serving of the edict was left in the hands of the interim Moderator of session. The following elders' commissions were received, and their names ordered to be placed on the roll of Presbytery, namely, St. James, Charlottetown, Morell West River, Covehead, Bloom-

field, Cavendish, Zion, Charlottetown, Alberton, Marshallfield, Stratford, Caledonia, Montague, Carleton Place, Souris, in favor of John McInnis, A. S. Nicholson, A. A. McNeill, James G. McCallum, A. S. Gordon, Oliver LePage, John A. Lawson, B. Rogers, R. Munn, John A. Mathieson, A. J. McPherson, James Moar, Alex. Martin, W. R. Webster, respectively.

T. C. James gave an interesting and comprehensive account of his attendance at the General Assembly, Rey. John Murray, Clifton, was nominated Moderator of the forthcoming Synod. A. J. McNeill and T. F. Fullerton were appointed to take the steps necessary to secure Mr. Murray's election.

H. A. Kent, M. A., was nominated as assistant and successor to Dr. Cairns, Professor of Hebrew and Old Testament Exegesis in the Theological College, Halifax.

A. Craise and John Hawley reported on their work at the P.E.I. Hospital and Falconwood, respectively. These reports were received, adopted and ordered to be forwarded to the secretary of the Home Mission Board.

J. W. McKenzie and John Stirling reported the session records of St. James' as neatly and correctly kept, and they were accordingly attested by the Moderator.

On motion, Geo. E. Ross was appointed a member of Presbytery's Committee on Augmentation, in place of E. Smith, resigned.

It was moved, seconded and carried, that application be made to the Home Mission Board for \$22 for pulpit supply at Georgetown.

The following committee was appointed to meet and consult with the congregations of Cardigan and Georgetown ament union, namely, W. H. Spencer, Convener, J. W. McKenzie, T. F. Fullerton, Geo. E. Ross, M. N. McLeod, D. B. McLeod, ministers, and T. C. James, elder.

Presbytery then adjourned, to meet at the call of the Moderator and clerk, of which public intimation was given, and this sederunt was closed with the benediction.

Connie Mack, with a team of youngsters, with the smallest payroll of any big league team, is pushing Hugh Jennings, Tigers hard for the lead.

The 1909 Athletics is the result of a daring plan of Mack. The old Athletics, winners of two pennants, always to be figured on in the race, were wearing out. In 1907, after a hard fight, they lost their chance for the pennant in a 17-inning struggle with Detroit.

In that game young energy and enthusiasm triumphed against old, seasoned base ball mechanism. The old players—once the glory of the game—couldn't stand the gaft. And Connie Mack, sitting obscurely under the roof of the players' bench, was thinking, thinking.

He could risk one year of unpopularity, he decided—the unpopularity that follows the manager of a losing team. He would devote a year—the year 1908—to training up for 1909 in the meantime, forget the pennant. So the old Athletics disappeared. Socks Seybold went back to the minors. The brilliant "Jimmy" Col-

SOUTH AFRICAN ACT OF UNION

LONDON, Aug. 7.—J. H. Hofmeyr, the founder and chairman of the Afrikaner Bond, and the man who had refused a seat in the convention at the beginning, and had thrown the whole of his remarkable strength into the scale against unification, re-

cently arrived in England. Mr. Hoffmeyr is one of the delegates entrusted with the charge of the South African act of union in its passage through parliament. Being questioned, he has given out the following as his views on the race problem, which has occasioned so much discussion in South Africa. Mr. Hofmeyr said: "I always draw a line between racialism and racial hatred. There is a benign racialism as well as a benevolent one. I will associate myself with a man because he is English or Dutch; I will not appoint men to any office on account of their race; I will not learn the other man's language on account of racial feeling, and will not give equal rights to languages on account of so-called patriotism carried to a dangerous extreme."

With regard to Mr. Schriener's mission to England in connection with the subject of native representation in the South African parliament Mr. Hofmeyr declared: "I regret that Mr. Schriener should have undertaken this mission if for no other reason than that I believe he may be able to cause some trouble and perhaps some delay in passing the union bill, but I do not believe that he can succeed, even if he so desires, in stopping it for good here or in getting it amended in the way desired by him. I believe moreover, that if he did succeed in carrying the amendments he advocates, South Africa would reject the draft bill and there would be no union. All efforts in the interests of the natives ought to be made in the parliament of South Africa, and not elsewhere."
