**"The Power and the Glory"—Truly Great At Prince Edward**

At the Prince Edward Theatre is a motion picture which can truly be called great. It is "The Power and the Glory" and it is an original story by Preston Sturges, author of that successful play "Strictly Dishonorable".

This story, which is one of genuine interest, has a treatment new to pictures and just what this unusual treatment is will not be revealed here, in justice to Mr. Sturges, author, to William K. Howard, who did a fine job as director, and to Jesse L. Lasky, the producer. The picture is superbly acted. Spencer Tracy gives a performance of great power and establishes himself as an unusually fine character actor. Colleen Moore, who has not appeared on the screen for some time, has a straight dramatic role. It is a new line of work for her and she comes through with flying colors. Ralph Morgan gives the best performance of his career in this picture. As no time does his own personality intrude upon with the characterization.

The photography is flawless. Every one should go to see it whether for good acting or for the advance in the cinema, an occasion that arises all too seldom.

**Mystery And Two Serials At Capitol**

Excellent acting, fascinating backgrounds, characters who are much alive, and a plot which bubbles over with suspense all play their parts in making Universal's "Bombay Mail," which opened at the Capitol Theatre last night one of the most gripping screen-play mysteries seen in a long time.

The story, written by L. G. Blochman, who is well versed on life in the East, is set in India, has to do with the "Bombay Mail," a fast express train racing from Calcutta to Bombay, and the people on that train. These include a much-hated and feared British colonial governor, a manarajah, an American miner with a fortune in rubies, an aide to the governor who fears the loss of his position, a scientist with a live cobra in a suitcase, a supposed Russian spy who is quite beautiful, the governor's wife, and an Eurasian crook, to mention only a few.

The governor is murdered. Inspector Dyke is called in on the case and is just at the point of solving the mystery when the manarajah is shot in the back. However, a scientist who has captured the killer, but has been of much service to other characters aboard the express.

Edmund Lowe does a fine job as Inspector Dyke. Onlaw Stevens and the beautiful Shirley Grey supply the love interest. John Davidson is excellent as the Eurasian crook, and Hedda Hopper, Ralph Forbes, Jean Leon, Thomas, John Way, Tom Moore and Brandon Burst put life into their roles.

Much of the fascination of the picture lies in the bizarre settings, new background for a mystery story. Of chief interest is the Indian train, the quaint stations, and the feeling one has of the teeming millions in the exotic country of countless secrets.

**Export of Farm Products to United States Shows Increase Over Last Year**

**The Coopers Business**

The value of the products of the coopers industry in 1932 was \$1,514,000 compared with \$1,954,000 in 1931, exclusive of the coopers assembled by hand or with very simple machinery by farmers and fruit growers and where wood using industries assemble barrels as a side line.

**Index Number of Mining Stocks**

The weighted index number of twenty-three mining stocks computed by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics on the basis of 1928=100, was 128.8 for the week ending March 15, as compared with 124.6 for the previous week. Nineteen gold stocks rose from 120.5 to 128.8, and four base metals stocks from 144.2 to 151.4.

**Exports to Empire Countries in February Increased 35 per cent.**

Exports to British Empire countries in February amounted in value to \$17,067,000 compared with \$12,654,000 in February 1933, which was an increase of \$4,413,000 or 35 per cent. Exports to the United Kingdom increased 21 per cent.

**Exports to Foreign Countries in February Increased 51 per cent.**

Exports to foreign countries in February amounted to \$20,816,000 compared with \$13,744,000 in February 1933, an increase of \$7,072,000 or 52 per cent. Exports to the United States increased by 67 per cent.

**AUSTRALIA GREAT WINE PRODUCING COUNTRY**

The production of wine is one of the major industries of Australia. It is estimated that roughly 10,000,000 gallons are produced in Australia, states the Canadian National Steamships. The average annual domestic production is 18,000,000 gallons, 5,000,000 gallons being exported abroad. Of the total exports during the first nine months of 1933, the United Kingdom took 2,464,561 out of a total import of 7,786,587 gallons. There is apparently a growing recognition of the wide range and high quality of Australian wines which are not limited to the sweet wines as formerly. An increased demand for hocks or port and burgundy types is noted. The wine industry of Australia is centered in South Australia, Victoria and New South Wales.

**LOVING FRIENDS ON NEGRO'S BOND**

CHICAGO, April 4.—Mrs. Myrtle Tanner Blackledge finally got out of jail today.

In her endurance contest with Mrs. Suzanne Nottingham, wife of a policeman, who says the former politician stole his love, Mrs. Blackledge, a former collector of internal revenue here, has been a consistent loser.

She lost the \$7,500 verdict awarded Mrs. Nottingham for alienation of affections. She lost her motion picture rights, and she lost her fight to stay out of jail, when Mrs. Nottingham was determined to send her, even though it cost \$3.50 a week to keep the malice implication carried with the verdict.

Today the tide turned.

Judge Joseph B. David approved a \$2,500 bond posted by Aaron Anderson, negro, pending her appeal on a habeas corpus writ in her suit to set aside the verdict.

**NEW DOG, CAT TAKES PROPOSED**

Novel taxes on dogs and cats should be adopted as a means of raising funds to finance unemployed relief projects according to Lord Kilmartin, who outlined them in the British House of Lords. Dog taxes he said be graded, he suggested, and the biggest burden fall on women who are willing to pay \$2.50 a week to keep their pets in good homes. Cats, he said, would be very popular in some quarters. "There are too many of them he added."

**ILLNESS GREATER WHEN PAY LOWER**

NEW YORK, April 5.—A survey indicating that wage earners whose income was reduced between 1929 and 1932 had 39 per cent more babies than those whose income was not cut, was made public today by the Milbank Memorial Fund. The same survey showed there was 50 per cent more illness in families whose income dropped. The study was made in a house to house canvass of 8,000 families.
