SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of the family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section 160 acres, more or less.

Applications for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Land Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated.

Entry by proxy may however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of any intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans.

(1) At least six months residence upon the cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered by him in the vicinity such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the (father, or mother.)

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by him self must notify the Agent or the district of such intention.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for patent.

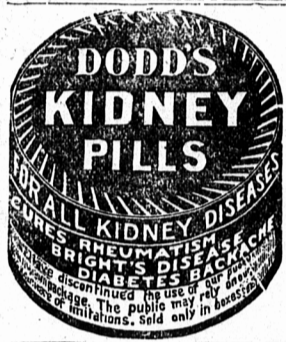

GENERAL BULLER, THE COMMANDER AT TUGELA



The late General Buller was born on December 7th, 1839, was educated at Eton and entered the army in 1858 being attached to the 60th Rifles. He served in China in 1860, in the Red River Expedition in 1870, the Ashanti War in 1874, Kafir

War in 1878, Zulu War 1878-79 being made Brevet Lieutenant Colonel, winning the Victoria Cross, and receiving the honor of C. M. G. He was chief of Staff in the Boer War of 1881 and was attached to the Intelligence Department in the Egyptian Campaign of 1882, being mentioned in despatches and receiving various other honors in that war. He served through the Sudan in 1884-85, winning the rank of Major General. He was made Quartermaster General in 1887 and for a short time served as Under Secretary for Ireland. He received the appointment as Adjutant General in 1890 and held this office until 1897, being then transferred to the command at Aldershot. In 1899 he went to South Africa, first as General commanding the forces against the Boers and afterwards as General Officer Commanding in Natal. He conducted the operations for the relief of Ladysmith which was successfully accomplished, after many defeats, during an investment of one hundred and eighteen days. Following the relief of Ladysmith he conducted the operations resulting in the expulsion of the Boer army from Natal and on returning to England was appointed in command of the first Army Corps at Aldershot.

PROHIBITION IN KING'S

Sir.—Your leader in The Guardian of May 30 is timely and correctly expresses the sentiments of the temperance party in King's Co., where an excellent law has been dragged in the mud through gross maladministration of the Provincial Alliance waited on the Government and among other things asked for the removal of the present King's Co. prosecutors and the appointment of Angus McIntyre of Souris in their stead.

About six weeks after that date some King's Co. member of the Provincial Alliance learned in an unofficial way that there is no present intention of making the desired change, but that the men in office will be charged to do their duty—an old story for King's and one which lost its point and charm a long time ago.

It is with Southern King's mostly that this letter proposes to deal, as the work of M. J. Campbell of Eton can be more efficiently reviewed by those in closer touch with him than your present correspondent. And I shall say first that Henry Campbell is utterly unfitted for his office and to this any person who has ever heard him conduct a trial can bear ready witness. To say this is no reflection on that gentleman, for whilst a man may be a good farmer he may be a very poor lawyer and vice versa. Mr. Campbell's great weakness, however, is in the stubborn-

ture of his office, after his repeated rejection by the Temperance people, in which course he seems to be backed by reactionary party heeler, also the liquor men and their friends. It is believed that during his first year in office Mr. Campbell did a great deal of good work as he was able to do, but for a long time now he seems to have fallen on evil times and has taken his cue not from the Temperance people, but from a sly and alien crew. Now, Sir, somebody is responsible for gross malfeasance in the administration of the Prohibition Act in King's Co. In December 1906, Prosecutor Jenkins had in his hand evidence sufficient to convict a Mortgage druggist of two offences, and enough was sent to Mr. Campbell to proceed with the first case with instructions to set his date to give room for a second offence. What happened? The first case was brought down to the date on which it was entered, and the second one, of course, could not be brought on. On being remonstrated with the Prosecutor said he did as he was instructed, but the Magistrate suggested that he had better make it three months from day of entering charge.

In the spring of 1907 another case was to be brought against the same offender. One morning afterwards the papers in the case were handed to constable John Fraser, who refused to take them, knowing that the man had skipped away. Nearly a week later defendant returned and the next move was that the dogs had been called off because of sickness in the family. The affliction in due time passed away, but never yet has that case been proceeded with. Mr. Campbell says he got orders from Charlottetown to stay his hand in this case; if so we ask who has a right to clog the wheels of Justice in this way? In March of this year Mr. Campbell brought another case against this same druggist and one against another old offender, both for 1st offence. Why for 1st offence? Probably because he got orders from his masters. Now, Sir, in spite of all this, can any righteous or reasonable person tell why Henry Campbell is kept in office? Probably because somebody has a tighter grip on the throat of the Government than the Temperance people have.

This letter is not written with a partisan feeling nor for the purpose of vilifying the Government which generally speaking has been favorable to the Temperance people. The late Premier stood valiantly by the Act in many instances, in one case especially when its efficiency was threatened, but like many a man in his position his hand was forced in some things and we know it to have been forced by party petitions in a former edition of this very matter. Perhaps Mr. Hazzard's intentions are as good as were Mr. Peter's, but he may find himself in a similar position. If so, it is for him to decide on the wiser course to pursue. Let it suffice to say that P. E. I. has men of both parties and belonging to neither, who are of pure and noble purpose and some independence of character; that in the constituency of King's at least the blood of Liberals and Conservatives alike is up in respect of this matter and some life-long Liberals and excellent citizens have expressed their intention of turning their backs upon their party at the coming election. We shall see what we shall see.
