

Maroons Trim Boston Bruins 4-1

Trottier And Siebert Big Guns On Montreal Front Line Attack.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 15.—A stout defence and greater accuracy in enemy territory earned the Montreal Maroons a 4 to 1 victory over the Boston Bruins here last night in their opening game of the National Hockey League season.

The Maroons ran in two goals in the first period and one in each of the others. Boston counted in one second and were successfully held off in the last period as Art Ross sent his dead-end snipers on a sweeping attack leaving only one man on the defence.

The Maroons won through superior early season form. The Bruins showed but flashes of their greatness of last season's play-offs. There was loose play from both teams, however, and the puck was batted around the ice like a game of shinny.

Trottier was the first to score, after 8 minutes of play. Trottier picked up "Baldy" Northcott's pass and snapped a fast one past Thompson into the Bruin cage. Siebert and Smith combined for the second goal. Siebert gave Thompson no chance with a terrific drive from inside the defence.

Eddie Shore figured in Boston's lone tally in the second period. Eddie carried the puck up, backhanded a pass from the boards, and Marty Barry drilled it into the net. Babe Siebert took another pass from Hooley Smith and scored from an angle.

Jimmy Ward scored an easy goal in the last period.

LEAFS AND Easterbrooks Is CANADIENS Barred For 1932 PLAY TIE

M. A. H. A. Metes Out Penalty To Left Winger Who Was Signed Up With Two Clubs, Amherst And Abegweits.

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 15.—Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Canadiens played a 1-1 tie in their first meeting of the present National Hockey season at Maple Leaf Gardens Saturday night. Around 12,000 spectators watched a game that was slowed up considerably by penalties through almost the entire seventy minutes.

Both teams played below the standard of hockey expected of them and with the exception of the second period when both goals were scored and only two penalties awarded, the hockey was ragged and without polish, though the brilliant work of both goal-keepers was a large factor in keeping down the score. With Cotton in the penalty box in the second period Jollat gave Canadiens the lead. He scored from close in after picking up the puck inside the Leaf's blue line, sticking his way through a couple of Toronto defenders and beating Chabot with a tricky wrist shot. Within five minutes Conacher equalized for the Leafs.

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 15.—Steve Easterbrooks, left wing player of Moncton Victorias last winter, was barred from hockey for the year 1932 by the registration committee of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association at a meeting here yesterday. This penalty was meted out to the left wing star when it became known he had signed with the Amherst Hockey Club on May 14 last for the coming hockey season, and the following day, May 15, signed with the Abegweit Club of Charlottetown. Delegates from Amherst and Charlottetown held a conference in an effort to reach an agreement, but failed and after reporting to the committee, the penalty was meted out.

Easterbrooks, a native of Amherst, broke into senior hockey with the St. John Beavers two years ago, and when that team disbanded came to Moncton and played last year with the Victorias in the southern league. The committee had five players before them for a ruling and Red Teller, Montreal, who played last season with Bathurst, and left early in the spring for Halifax, is the property of the Wolverines of that city, it was ruled, while it was established that Spec Peebles, last year with the New Glasgow Tigers, had established his residence in Amherst; and is eligible to play for that town. Teller had been claim-

ed by Bathurst for the coming hockey season while the status of Peebles was of interest to Mount Allison University where he enrolled as a student. Two other players whose names are not mentioned, but who played for Berwick last winter, were brought before the committee who ruled that their domicile is in Berwick and they must play for that town. They had been working out of town during the summer and their case was brought up by the Berwick Club. H. O. Schryer, President of the M. A. H. A. presided at the meeting and other members of the registration committee present were: J. F. McManus, Halifax, Nova Scotia, vice president of the M. A. H. A. J. E. Starns, Charlottetown, P. E. I., vice president of the M. A. H. A. H. V. White, Bathurst, Secretary of the M. A. H. A. C. C. Gillespie, president of the M. P. B. A. U. of C. The delegates included, Harry Butler and J. H. Conn, Halifax Wolverines; James Wry, President of the central section league of the M. A. H. A.; Mr. H. F. Tennant, Amherst, Miss Trenholme, Amherst Hockey Club and W. A. Smith of the Abegweits Club. It was the first time a lady delegate has attended a meeting of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association.

Caledonia Lost To Wanderers 9-5

Heavy Scrum And Hard Kicking Of "Red Shirts" Too Much For The MacTier Cup Holders.

(Canadian Press) HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 15.—Halifax Wanderers will represent Nova Scotia in the final for Maritime English rugby supremacy. A gallant little band of Caledonians out of Glace Bay disputed the issue with the "big red" squad to the last ditch here yesterday. The final score was Wanderers, 9; Caledonia, 5. The city team will now play off with University of New Brunswick for the McCurdy Cup.

Yesterday's game, played in bright sunshine, but with a bitter down-fall wind, was the best witnessed here this season. Caledonia's light squad, playing a fast-running, short-passing game, took an edge on territory at the start, and the first half went by on practically even terms. With their backs to the wind in the second half, the Halifax side, depending on their heavy scrum for possession of the ball, gained ground and held it with long and accurate punts, Caledonia's crossing the fifty yard line less than half a dozen times in this period. Awarded a penalty kick on one of these invasions, the score 9 to 5 against them, the Cape Bretoners elected to try a placement from a difficult angle, Danny Nicholson's foot missing the posts by less than a foot.

The game was an exhibition of two entirely different types of English rugby. Caledonia never kicked on offense, using the touchline only when pressed back under their own posts. Even when awarded a penalty, the Glace Bay ruggers kicked high and in the field of play, following up fast under the ball. It is a prettier game than the punting offense, but the weight and sustained kicking power of the Wanderers proved too much for the MacTier Cup holders to contend with.
