Dinner Hour Arouses Animals Of Jungle Held Captive In Zoo

(United Press.) CINCINNATI, Aug. 12.—A large female dog dispossessed of her puppies, is the best friend of Sol Stephen, curator of the Cincinnati Zoological Garden. She is used quite frequently to nurture the younger members of the cat family who have been cast aside by their natural mothers.

Several of the jungle cats which inhabit the zoo have had a female dog as their adopted mother. To look at them, however, no one would suspect that they had been brought up by "foster" parents, and Mr. Stephen asserted he would not be able to tell if it were not for the fact that he brought the female dog to them.

Big, strong and healthful these cats, the offspring of ferocious jungle animals, are complacent in their new environment until feeding time. They are aware of this hour and make their demands known in deep penetrating roars. The majority of the younger cats have been nursed by a mother dog, but they are not as tranquil and docuous as the mother dog would want them to be. As soon as they are able to pull their bodies around they start acting in a manner true to the strain that runs through their veins.

They pull and tear at the old mother dog and make life miserable for her in general. While the kitten can do this to their mother, she is a certain degree they all seem to sense the limit, according to Mr. Stephen, and stop their rough play in time to avoid a swift cuff with the paw.

Abandonment of kittens by their mothers is not a rarity. This season Mr. Stephen has had unusual good luck to have all the cats remain with their kittens. Odd as it may seem, the male of the cat species is a more attentive parent. Seemingly to him the cubs are annoying, for in a majority of the cases he will have nothing to do with them.

The zoo has one of the greatest collections of animals in the country. It has been honored by the birth of triplets to Lola, the lioness, and twins to the leopardess. Mr. Stephen said this was one of the few times that triplets have been born to any of the cat families here.

Old Waterman's Fight With Pirates

(By Dominion News Service.) LONDON, Aug. 18.—Sixty-two jolly old watermen, watermen's wives and watermen's widows, are spending the evening of their days in a pleasant retreat in Penge, Kent.

The retreat is described as the Royal Asylum for Watermen and Lightermen, but it is known locally by the more friendly name of the Watermen's Home. For more than 100 years, the little houses with a big central hall for social gatherings in the middle of them, have stood round three sides of a big square garden filled with trees and flowers.

All the old men who live in the little three-roomed houses, who plant their vegetable gardens, and play bowls on the green, began life at the water-side. They took part in the bustling ceremony of loading and unloading the great ships which used to lie out in the river, but which are now docked so close, leaving the waterman of much of his old-time importance.

All the old watermen were taken a trip down the Thames lately. When they returned to Penge they talked over the changes which have taken place on the river, and came to the conclusion that the river was not what it used to be.

80-Year-Old Master.

Mr. William Jackson, who has been master of the Watermen's Home for 11 years and who is over 80 years old, told a Press representative that in the days when he and his brother watermen were in their prime ships would be waiting in lines to be unloaded.

The master at 14 was apprenticed to an uncle who was one of a family of watermen.

He only stayed on the riverside for a month of two, and then sailed away as an apprentice on a barque bound for India, and wherever else she could pick up a "trade."

The boy's first voyage lasted four years. He arrived in India just after the Indian Mutiny in 1857 and saw mutineers blown from the guns. The crew of the Conflict stowed away six of the crew of one of the "John" Company's boats, who, in those days, served under almost Navy conditions.

THAT CAR OF YOURS

THE DRIVE SHAFT

The drive shaft of a car is connected from the forward universal joint to the differential, either through a rear joint or not according to the type of drive used in the car.

In the case of an internal drive where the torque is taken through the shaft housing, just one joint is used at the forward end. This is of lesser expense than the conventional Hotchkiss Drive used in the majority of higher priced cars.

The drive in this case is taken through the rear spring and the shaft itself intercepted by two universal joints, one at the front and one at the rear of the shaft, usually in the form of thermoid discs.

The car using this type of joint is comparatively quiet in action and not susceptible to wear as in the internal drive.

In cases where the propeller shaft housing is connected to a yoke suspension is connected on the front end of the propeller shaft housing to take the drive or torque. This yoke is connected then, on portable pins to the chassis proper.

300,000 Boy Scouts

(By Dominion News Service.) LONDON, August 19.—The Duke of Connaught opened the Boy Scouts' Imperial Jamboree in the Stadium at Wembley on August 1. Nearly 300,000 scouts from all parts of the Empire were present at the festival, which lasted for a week.

About 13,000 scouts actually took part, and these were encamped at Wembley, near the Exhibition grounds. There were 41 acres of camp, and 2,500 tents and marquees. The water supply was specially put in to provide 80,000 gallons a day. Every day 50,444 meals were served. The camp had its own post, telegraph and telephone offices and its own fully equipped hospital.

The Duke of Connaught has special qualifications, from the Scout point of view, as he is a duly initiated Indian Chief, having been adopted into their tribe many years ago by the Six Nation Indians during one of his visits to Canada. The opening ceremony began with a procession of scouts from India,

London Has a Great Many Gardens

LONDON, August 18.—Canadians in London, asked for their impressions, almost invariably have something to say about the wonderful displays of flowers in the parks, and still more about the little gardens—often no more than backyards, but nice and attractive—found even in the poorer districts. In this country the gardening instinct is very widely distributed; the amateur gardener is the rule and not the exception. Every year new recruits come in, and existing gardens improve. London supports at least eight papers that deal exclusively with the amateur's garden, and almost every "daily" publishes weekly gardening articles. The gardens at Hampton Court, Kew and Regent's Park, to say nothing of the suburban parks, are sources of continual help and inspiration. A great London morning paper, which has just held its second annual competition for amateurs, states that whereas last year the gardens of some prize-winners were bordered on either side by more or less neglected plots, this year the "next doors" have mended their ways so that 400 square yards; formal gardens the contrast is no longer striking, under 350 square yards; and gardens of houses rated at under £35 classes for gardens of less than (\$375) a year.
