Heat Wave in New York

NEW YORK, June 23.—The hottest June 22 in the history of the local weather bureau was recorded when the mercury sprang to 93 this afternoon from a low of 69 a few hours earlier. The sudden jump of 24 degrees brought discomfort to sweltering millions. Several heat prostrations were reported.

TWO MORE U-BOATS SUNK

WASHINGTON, June 23.—Riddled by shells from destroyers, two more of the German submarines (turned over to the United States for experimental purposes) have found a resting place on the floor of the Atlantic Ocean. They were sunk 60 miles off Cape Charles Lightship, near where on yesterday naval aviators bombed and sank the first of the submarines in the opening phase of the joint army and navy bombing tests.

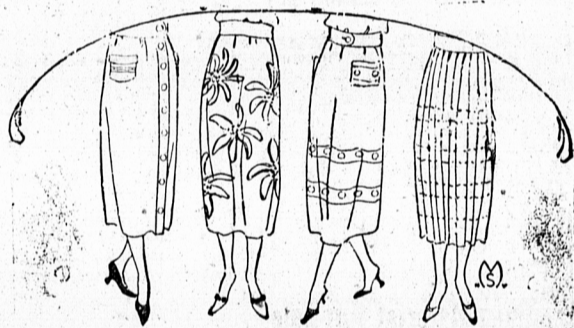
Infantry Camp Notes

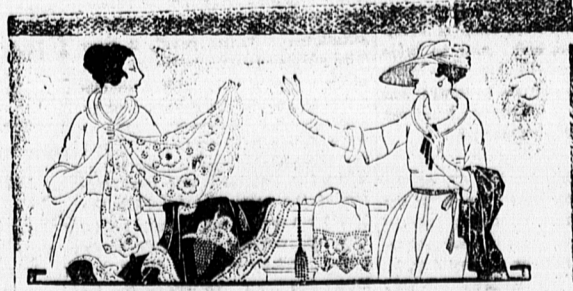
