Three children died in infancy and a daughter, Jean, died in Vancouver, also a son, Edward, who died there from the effects of the first Great War. Interment was in Vancouver. SPIDERS MENACE AUSSIE GOLDFISH —(CP)—Brisbane, Australia, June 5.—(CP)—The mystery of the missing goldfish at Leslie Park, Warwick—has been solved and one of the murderers caught in the act. Having been told something by a small boy, Leslie Park gardener went to the goldfish pond and discovered a large spider feeding on the stomach of a goldfish, two and a half inches long. The head had been eaten away and the dead fish was glued to a burfish, tail up. The murderer was summarily executed. Expert evidence has now been given by an Australian museum entomologist, who said there has been several cases in Australia, America and Europe of spiders eating fish. The Warwick case was a typical one, he said. The spider waits for its prey near the water's edge, darts out on its victim and bites it behind the head with its poisonous fangs. Then it secures the fish to any solid object with a fluid secretion and dines at leisure.

Urged Hitler To Sue For Peace

NUERNBERG, June 6—(AP)—Field Marshal Erwin Rommel and Field Marshal Gerd von Rundstedt in July, 1944, urged Hitler to sue for peace because of the hopeless situation in France. Col.-Gen. Alfred Jodl declared today at his war crimes trial. Jodl also said Hitler had decided to attack Russia in 1941 because Russia had massed troops on the German border, and Hitler feared the Soviet Union was waiting only for an Allied attack before abandoning her neutrality. Jodl said that at a conference with Hitler in July, 1944, a month after the Normandy invasion, "Von Rundstedt and Rommel-Rommel particularly stated in unmistakable language how serious the entire situation in France was. Anglo-American forces made a mockery of the situation, and our ground forces were powerless." "Rommel asked Hitler: 'My Fuehrer, have you actually imagined continuation of this war?' " "Hitler grew very angry and said: 'That is a question which is none of your business. That is a question I will decide.'

Australian Forests To Get "New Deal"

(By JACK HOLDEWORTH (Canadian Press Correspondent)) SYDNEY, Australia, June 5.—(CP)—Forest areas in Australia are small but are being developed sufficiently to supply the whole of Australia's timber requirements. Only one per cent of the total area of Australia is forested, compared with 20 per cent in Canada, and at present much Australia's timber is imported. The imports are mainly softwoods because 90 per cent of Australia's timber trees consist of hardwoods, belonging to the eucalyptus (gum-tree) family. Lumber imports are from Canada. Before the war, Canada sent Australia annually about 9,000,000 super feet of lumber, but the war affected this trade and her total dropped to about 2,000,000 super feet. Under the impact of smaller imports and big war demands, Australia had largely to depend on her own timber and the experience she gained there is now being put into developmental plans. In New South Wales, one of the biggest state planting programs is valued at about \$8,000,000 the state government is spending the money on about \$4,000,000 on high priority works to conserve and extend forests. Under the plan, the government hopes that in time the state's timber needs will be met entirely from its own forests. The plan will include the planting of exotic tree plantations, the establishment of three nurseries, and of 24 coastal nurseries and a technical education in silviculture. The plantations will be established at four widely separated parts of the state, planting being spread over 26 years at a total cost of \$6,000,000. In Queensland, another large timber state, a similar program of development has been put in motion by the state government. In Tasmania, big paper mill industries have been established and there are extensive developmental plans. It is estimated that, in all, 20,000,000 acres of forest will be needed to provide for the future requirements of Australia. This represents a total increase over the existing area of 1.02 per cent.

Austin Appointed U.S. Representative On Security Council

WASHINGTON, June 6—(AP)—President Truman today selected Senator W. W. Austin, Vermont Republican, to be the United States representative on the United States Security Council. The appointment will not become effective until next January. The White House explained that a constitutional limitation prevents Senator Austin from succeeding now to the position just resigned by Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg. Until Senator Austin can take over at the end of the Senate term to which he was elected, Herschel Johnson will represent the United States in United Nations affairs. Mr. Johnson has been serving as deputy American representative.

Wool Marketing

Wool will be received at Registered Wool Warehouse Number 18, Potato Growers' Warehouse at the foot of Prince Street, Charlottetown, after June 17th. Wool shipped should be carefully tagged and addressed to the Wool Grading Station, Charlottetown, "Freight Collect". Wool shipped by truck will be entitled to rail rates only. Truckers must present a proper warehouse receipt before truckage will be paid. An advance of 22 cents per pound will be made on all wool of satisfactory quality and properly prepared for marketing. The balance will be paid as soon as wool is graded. In shipping, each fleece should be tied separately with paper string and packed in old, clean sack. Do not ship in large number of bags. Use one large sack if at all possible, as this aids in checking. A number of old, clean sacks sewed together will suffice. Each sack should be tagged with the name and address of the owner written in clear lettering with ink, one tag to be securely attached to the outside of the sack and another placed on the inside. No responsibility will be accepted for sacks without tags. A deduction of 1 cent per pound will be made for wool tied with binder twine or other unsatisfactory string. Shipping tags and proper paper twine are available at the Provincial Department of Agriculture.

BONUS ON WOOL

A bonus of 4 cents a pound on all standard grades of Canadian wool will be paid by the Provincial and Dominion Departments of Agriculture on fleeces properly prepared for marketing. The payment of the bonus will be made direct to the grower through the Provincial Department for wool approved and passing through the Registered Warehouse. Growers will please observe the following rules: 1. Remove any heavy tags and dung locks before tying each fleece. 2. Remove any burry, straw, or dirty wool before tying. 3. Remove any other chaffy, or strawy portions of fleeces, or shake out light chaff before tying. 4. Shear when fleeces are dry. Keep wool from getting damp. 5. All these rejects, packed separately, may go forward as part of the shipment. The bonus will not be paid on: (1) Any reject wool. (2) Fleeces tied with binder twine. (3) Wool received in wet, or musty condition, or on any clip that requires a lot of reconditioning at time of grading. The bonus is not difficult to secure if the above simple rules are followed, but it applies only on clips received free of rejects, or when rejects are separated by the owner. It is expected that the wool warehouse will operate for one month from the date of opening from June 17th to July 17th. All wool should be delivered in this period.
