Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The sole head of a family or any sole over eighteen years old, may homestead a section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation on certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties: Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties: Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation on certain conditions. W. W. LUDY M. G. FROM THE TRENCHES

The following letter was received by Mrs. Laura McKinnon, teacher, Monticello, from her brother, Sergeant N. J. McKinnon, 13th Reserve Battalion, England. Shorehan, Camp March 17, 1917

My Dear Sister—Your most welcome letter received not long ago and needless to say glad to hear from you. This is St. Patrick's day but am celebrating it in a much quieter manner than I would on P. E. I. Life is so different in the Army that it crept up on me unawares this year, as I have not thought of it until this very morning. However it is my sincere wish that you spend a real old fashioned 17th of Ireland and enjoy yourselves in keeping with the occasion. We are beginning to get very spring-like weather now and in a few weeks it should begin to look like summer. I heard numerous birds last week which sounded very much like summer birds. I just got back from a training course in Shorncliffe. This is a training Battalion for wounded soldiers who are able to return to the front. The sergeants are allowed midnight passes which I avail myself of the opportunity occasionally. The war news lately has been very good and it is hoped that the successes will continue. I think the war will be over next fall. Father Plus McDonald went to France as Chaplain. He was in good spirits and was very anxious to go. Haven't heard from Neil for some time. Undoubtedly he hasn't time for letter writing as there is heavy fighting going on now. Well Laura I must close. Write often. Your loving brother N. J.
