CAPT. JOHN A. NICHOLSON

The late Capt. John A. Nicholson, of Orwell Cove, who recently passed away at his home in Orwell Cove, was in his 77th year. He had been a great sufferer from asthma for many years, resulting fatally in serious heart affection. A master mariner by profession he closed his active career at sea in the Government Fishery Protective Service some sixteen years ago. His wife, formerly Miss Margaret Munro, of Vernon River, died on October 22, 1911.

Capt. Nicholson was a faithful attendant at church, while able to do so, and at all times a generous supporter of the work of the church to which he belonged. The surviving members of the family are two daughters and a son, John, who is at home on the farm. Another son, Lieutenant Angus Nicholson, was killed on the Western Front, in March, 1918, passing in the supreme sacrifice of courage and devotion. The daughters are Jessie, now supervisor of operating nurses in Sydenham Hospital, New York City; and Alice, who has been in almost constant attendance at home. Mr. D. J. Nicholson is the only surviving brother, Mrs. Mary McLeod, in California, and Miss Bella, Orwell Cove, are sisters.

Many paid their last tribute of respect and sympathy to the bereaved family at the services held last Saturday afternoon. The services were conducted by the Rev. G. A. Grant, of Orwell, assisted by a choir representative of all the churches led by Mrs. J. J. Larrabee at the organ. The hymns sung were "Will My Anchor Hold?" and "The Haven of Rest." Mrs. W. W. Gillis of Orwell Cove, sang the solo, entitled "The Harbor Bell" in a very feeling manner, assisted in the chorus by Mr. Milton Furness, of Vernon Bridge. Interment was made in the family plot in the Belfast cemetery.
