Selection Of Pea And Bean Seed

(Experimental Farms Note)

In the field of better seed production the real basis of selection starts with the choicest seed that is obtainable, not merely big selected seed, but the progeny of individual plants that have been grown under careful observation. The progenies from each of these observed selections, observed for variation in the plants, diseases and any undesirable characters should then be selected, so as to insure having the plants, pods and seeds as much alike as possible. To produce seed of the highest grade one must observe these methods and when the progeny of pea or bean plants prove to be of a relatively close range of variation and free from undesirable characters, this stock seed should be used for multiplication. The multiplied progeny of such selection work will prove the real value of what is intended to be looked upon as the best seed.

Growers should continue to select the seed from choice plants and multiply this in small plots where the most careful observations can be made of every plant.

Hand selection of a genuinely well bred strain of peas or beans will then be useful and the real value of this work will become apparent to those who have never before undertaken this method of plant improvement.

Another feature of this is, that seed of the best character will easily sell many bushels more of the same seed, through the profitable returns obtained by the growers.

It was Pliny the elder who said "Sow good seed" and his advice to the ancient growers is good advice to the present day tillers of the soil.

GIRL GUIDE NEWS

2nd Charlottetown Company

Thirty-two bundles of this clan came together for a bonnie meeting on St. Andrew's day when the program had a truly Scottish atmosphere. Foremost on the program was perhaps the acting by each Patrol of scenes from the life of St. Andrew. The act put on by the White Heather Patrol was voted the best and most original.

Two new recruits, Phyllis Arsenault and Beryl DeBlais, have been welcomed into the Company and are working hard on the Tenderfoot test which they must pass before being enrolled.

At the Court of Honour held later in the evening, the Patrol Leaders submitted their reports for November. These reports showed 7 Second Class Guides, 24 Tenderfoot Guides and 5 recruits in the Company with an average attendance of 31. Tests passed during the month include Morse, Laws, Nature, Posture, Stalking and Tracking, all being part of the Second Class test.

One Patrol reported holding a special meeting for Tenderfoot Review and three Patrols wish basket-ball teams organized.

Points toward the banner stand as follows: Scarlet Tangers 135, Bluebirds 120, Cychids 117, Orioles 116, and White Heathers 114, etc.

At next Friday's meeting there will be an investiture of a recruit and a Patrol Leader followed by a presentation of badges, service stars and Patrol Second insignia.

First Charlottetown Company

The meeting of December 3rd opened with the Guide Prayer, after which patrols went to their corners and roll books were marked. Captain and Lieutenant G. Fry inspected each patrol in its corner, while the other patrols studied test work, and instruction was given the recruits by their Patrol Leaders. Test passing for tenderfoot and second class followed, while the Company Leader gave further instruction to the recruits.

As the tables were being put up for St. Peter's Cathedral annual bazaar and tea on Wednesday, the hall was not available for games and Company drill, the extra time being spent on test work.

The Robin Patrol conducted the Campfire, and the meeting ended with Taps and the Magic Squeeze. During Campfire the Provincial Scout Commissioner, Mr. William Warren, arrived for first class

test passing, and took the Company's salute. After the close of the meeting Mr. Warren tested the Guides in knowledge of their history and development of Guiding, estimation of weights, use and knowledge of the compass, and in drawing a sketch map to direct a stranger from Guide Headquarters to visit the Chief of Police, the Premier, and the Bishop of Charlottetown. Bank books were inspected to see if the necessary Guide dollar was on deposit, in a savings bank, as a proof that the Guide is thrifty.

Next week-end tests will be held in stalking and tracking, in walking the Guide 2 miles, and in judging heights and distances.

An organization meeting was held on Wednesday, November 28th, at the home of the 1st Charlottetown Company's Captain, for the purpose of organizing a Guides' Council for the discussion of different Guide activities, for mutual help in Guides' problems, and for closer co-operation between the Guilders of Charlottetown.

Miss J. R. Fullerton was nominated for the position of President, Miss D. Reay for Vice-President, and Miss G. Fry for Secretary.

As the meeting was called for organization only, the remainder of the evening was spent in a general discussion of the duty of the Captain and the Company to the new recruit, and what the new recruit should be asked to do at her first meeting.

At the next meeting of the Council, which is to be called by the Secretary in three weeks' time, papers will be read by Miss G. Fry on the relations between the Guide Company and the Brownie Pack, and by Miss D. Bentley on the teaching and passing of the Guide tenderfoot test. This will be followed by a general discussion of the papers, and of any questions of general interest that may arise.
