## Americans and Chihawks Play 2-2 Overtime Tie continues without check.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12—(AP)—Chicago Black Hawks and New York Americans played a 2-2 overtime tie in a National Hockey League game tonight before the smallest game in the Madison Square Garden season, about 5,000.

The one point was sufficient to pull Chicago up to a tie for third place with Boston Bruins, while Americans tied Montreal Canadiens for sixth place.

The New Yorkers had gone ahead on goals by Buzz Boll, in the first period, and Norman Larson in the second. But less than 40 seconds after the second New York goal, Johnny Chad got it back on a nice three-man rush with Bob Carse and Cully Dahlstrom, then early in the third period, Dahlstrom tipped in a 1-0 drive by Earl Selbert for the tying goal.

## Indulge in Sport despite Luftwaffe

LONDON, Dec. 12—Arrangements have been completed for the Canadian troops here to do a little battling among themselves. The set-up was announced today for an Association football competition which will see 64 teams in action.

Despite the frustrated efforts of Luftwaffe to turn playing fields into bunkers, there is still plenty of sport going on in England.

In the new competition the First Division will enter 40 teams, the second 17, the third will be seven and 20 in the holding units.

For the competition the teams will be entered in six groups, playing an elimination series to see which teams meet for the playoffs. The finals, scheduled to take place in March, will decide the champions of the Canadian Active Service Forces.

Apart from the finals there will be titles at stake for the leadership of the four branches of the service. For the championship of the First Division, a Montreal enthusiast has presented a shield, while the Hon. Vincent Massey, Canadian High Commissioner has presented three cups. One of these will go to winners of the Second Division football title. The other two are for softball and hockey between British and Canadian all-stars.

## Hogan leads Miami open

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 12—(AP)—Ben Hogan of White Plains, N.Y., the mightiest little man in golf, cracked out a three-under-par 67 today to share the first-round lead in the \$10,000 Miami Open with high-erto obscure Ben Loving of Springfield, Mass.

Hogan, front runner in the stretch battle for the year's money-winning honors, took a three-stroke margin over the No. 2 man, Jimmy Demaret of Houston, Texas, and had a two-shot lead over Sam Snead of Hot Springs, Ga., third high. Snead, 1940 Canadian Open champion, won the event last year.

Clayton Heafner, Linville, N.C., and the veteran Ed Dudley of Augusta, Ga., scored 68.

## Overlin puts Title on block

NEW YORK, Dec. 12—(AP)—Ken Overlin and Steve Bellosse are going to put on a re-take of the year's hottest punch party in Madison Square Garden tomorrow night, with Ken's middleweight championship on the block. The 49th Street betting set was laying "six to five and pick" tonight.

The last time these two fought it out, on Nov. 1 in the Garden, the tussle was such a thriller that promoter Mike Jacobs expects tomorrow's return will have 15,000 of the faithful making his turnstiles sing to the tune of \$30,000 to \$40,000.

## Establishment of Greyhound Studs In Canada?

TORONTO, Dec. 12—(CP)—Rupert Bain, Toronto sportsman, said today that six thoroughbred greyhounds, sent from England, are being cared for at his farm at nearby Orillia. He added that Col. R. A. de Rose of the English greyhound racing association, is coming to Toronto soon to consult with him regarding possible establishment of greyhound studs in Canada.

## Jimmy Wilson No. 1 comeback

NEW YORK, Dec. 12—(AP)—Out of necessity 40-year-old Jimmy Wilson went behind the plate for Cincinnati Reds in this fall's World Series. He was only a fill-in for Ernie Lombardi but he did such a grand job of catching that today he was voted the year's No. 1 comeback in the annual Associated Press poll.

Seventy-eight United States sports editors gave Jimmy 102 votes for a courageous performance that included perfect handling of the Reds' hurlers for the seven games, a .353 batting average and the only stolen base of the Series.

Twenty-three of the writers placed the new Chicago Cubs manager at the top of the list. Twenty-four of them gave the No. 1 berth to Clark Shaughnessy, Stanford football coach, but Wilson received more second and thirds and won by six points on a 3-2-1 scoring basis.

Baseball players easily dominated the poll, 13 of them receiving votes. Detroit's Schoolboy Rowe, although a failure in the World Series, did such a fine job of helping Detroit Tigers win the American League pennant that he ranked third with nine firsts and 57 points.

## Miners throw Vics for loss

GLACE BAY, N.S., Dec. 12—(CP)—The leading Miners of the Cape Breton Hockey League defeated North Sydney Victoria 5-3 tonight, stamping down Vics' bid for a first-place tie.

Two first-period goals by Jim Dewey gave the Miners a 2-0 margin, but Vics tied it up in the first six minutes of the second period as Steve Estrooke and Frank Clifton scored. But Vic Hannebury and playing coach Jo-Jo Graboski made it 4-2 for Glace Bay before the session ended.

Mike McKay brought the score up to 4-3 in the last half of the final period, but Hannebury's second goal made the victory safe for Glace Bay in the last minute.

## Maple Leafs Eke Out 4-3 Victory Over Canadiens To Increase League Lead

TORONTO, Dec. 12—(CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs increased their National Hockey League lead to six points over the idle Detroit Red Wings when they defeated Montreal Canadiens 4-3 here tonight.

It was the 13th scheduled game for each club but the ill luck usually attached to the number went against the Canadiens who fought courageously all the way. The Flying Frenchmen held a 2-1 lead in the second period but failed to hold on.

A crowd of 9,969 fans saw the contest in which penalties played a large part. Billy Taylor stole the puck in Montreal territory to score what proved to be the winning goal; the midway mark of the third period.

Thirteen minor penalties were handed out by referee Mickey Ion, eight of them going to the Canadiens. The Montrealers scored once while having an advantage in man power and bagged another while the Leafs had an edge in strength. One Toronto marker came while both clubs were playing two men short.

## Yanks to be Purchased soon?

NEW YORK, Dec. 12—(AP)—The \$4,000,000 deal for the purchase of New York Yankees by a group headed by James A. Farley will be completed within the next few days, brokers in the negotiations said today.
