GERMAN KAISER TO VISIT STATES

LONDON, Aug. 24.—Emperor William of Germany has a very strong desire to visit America, and it is possible that he may see his way to do it moderately soon.

His visit also would give him the great pleasure of coming into personal touch with the life of the United States. He wishes to do a lot of sightseeing, too. He wants to look over the big cities and examine their institutions, observe the American business and industrial methods, compare conditions in which various classes of the people are placed with the conditions of the corresponding classes in Germany, and mingle as much as possible in the social life of the country.

SERIOUS ASSAULT CASE IN MONCTON

Moncton Merchant the Victim of a Brutal Attack—Is Beaten into Insensibility—The Assailant Captured and Put in Jail—The Affair Thought to Have Been Prearranged—Moncton People Indignant.

MONCTON, N. B., August 25.—(Special)—A young man named Percy Myers, belonging to Sussex, is in jail here charged, with assault on W. P. Jonah, a well known merchant in this city.

The assault appears to be an outcome of a prearranged affair and as a result the injured man is in pretty bad shape, having received very severe injuries to face and being kicked about the body.

Jonah has taken some part in having ill-fame houses stamped out and it is believed the assault on him is the result of this, and was arranged by friends of the proprietors of these houses.

Jonah is standing in the Riverside hotel when Myers, who is about six feet in height walked in, and without any preliminary remarks walked up to Jonah and felled him to the floor with a

treacherous and unexpected blow. After knocking the victim down Myers jumped on him kicking him brutally about the face and body and inflicting a number of cuts and bruises.

Jonah in an unconscious condition was carried to his home while Myers left hastily but was afterwards captured at a barn at the horse track.

The affair has created great indignation here.

CUBA ASKS HELP OF UNCLE SAM

HAVANA, Aug. 24.—The Cuban Government sent to the Washington Government a request for the loan of eight rapid-fire guns manned by American artillerymen, for use in quelling the existing disorders.

It is not admitted that this equivalent to call for intervention under the terms of the Platt amendment, and indeed, intervention is regarded by the press the public as a remote possibility, the assertion being made that all indications point to the speedy restoration of order through the medium of the constituted authorities of the Cuban Republic.

YOUNG SPARROWS CAUSED TYPHOID

THREE OAKS, Mich Aug. 24.—The cause of an epidemic of typhoid fever in this place was discovered when a member of the board of Health climbed to the waterworks' standpipe and found the dead of several thousand young sparrows covering the surface of the water.

Hundreds of sparrow nests have been built on a ledge that runs around the summit of the standpipe and the young birds are supposed to have fallen in while trying to fly. The cover made for the standpipe when it was constructed was never put on. There are now twenty-one cases of typhoid in the town.

THE CORONATION BOMB THROWERS

MADRID, Aug. 24.—The newspapers of this city yesterday printed the report of the examining magistrate in the case of the coronation bomb throwing.

The police maintain the charges against Senor Ferrera, director of the modern school of Barcelona, and also Hamino who assisted in the escape of Morales. To persons who suffered damages to property by the explosion the magistrate awards \$3,670 damages. The report of the magistrate adds that by the explosion twenty-five persons were killed and 109 wounded, of which latter number, fourteen are still convalescing. The report says that evidence proves that Morales sent bombs from Barcelona to Paris to be used in an attempt on the life of King Alfonso while he was in the latter city.

H M S DREADNOUGHT IS INVINCIBLE

LONDON, August 24.—For the first time since the Dreadnought was laid down in October, 1905, the admiralty has published a detailed description of the most powerful battleship in the world.

The document which was issued last night, shows that the Dreadnought is practically invincible. She can engage the enemy and destroy them out of range of their fire; torpedoes may strike her below the water-line, but she will not sink while she has a coal bunker capacity which will permit her to steam 3500 miles at a uniform speed of eighteen and a half knots without coaling.

Her ten 12-in guns are so disposed that no fewer than eight of them can be fired simultaneously from either broadside, while six can be fired simultaneously ahead or astern. There is no warship afloat that would not be put out of action on receiving such a fire. The twenty-seven 12 pounder quick-firers are of a new design and greater power than those hitherto carried for use against torpedo craft, and in addition the ship has been guarded from destruction by submarine attack by taking care that the powerful bulkheads below the main deck (which is nine feet above the water line) are unperforated. Lifts are provided to give access to the various compartments. The armoring is of extraordinary strength. The main belt has a maximum thickness of 11 inches, the redoubt varies in thickness from 11 to 8 inches, while the deck is protected by armour plating from 1 3/4 to 2 3/4 inches in thickness.

"Mobility of forces is of prime necessity in war," the report declares. This mobility is gained by speed and fuel capacity. To gain this advantage the Dreadnought has been designed to travel at a maximum rate of 21 knots. Her coal bunker capacity of 2700 tons will permit her to steam 8900 knots at economical speed without coaling. The engines are steam turbines. The officers' quarters are on the main deck forward, near the turrets and coming tower, which are 11 inches thick. The cost of the Dreadnought was £1,797,497, and of this only £5329 remains to be spent.

In addition to the Dreadnought, three new armored cruisers are being built. These are the Invincible, the Indefatigable and the Indomitable. The main feature of their dimensions is their extraordinary length—530 feet as against the 490 feet of the battleship Dreadnought.
