THE CONVENTIONS AND THE TRAFFIC.

The Liberal and Conservative party conventions of Ontario which recently assembled at Toronto are now over and the attitude of both towards prohibition is now made clear. The Conservative party stands by the license system. The Liberals turned down both prohibition and Government ownership and declared for local option in the counties and cities, on petition of 25 per-cent of the ratepayers. This is substantially the basis of the Scott Act. The Liberal convention also declared against issuing any more new licenses in the unorganized territory known as New Ontario, that no new licenses be granted in licensed municipalities except on a petition of 50 per cent of the electors, and that any license holder twice convicted of violating the law shall forfeit his licence. From all of which it is clear that the liquor interest dominated both conventions.

We do not think The Patriot's synopsis of Rev. T. F. Fullerton's sermon of Sunday evening last quite brings out the attitude taken toward the prohibition of the liquor traffic. In speaking of some arbitrary prohibitions of ancient times we understood the reverend gentleman to point out, very properly, as we think, that a law enacted by a Legislature chosen by the people is entitled to more respect than any despotic decree.

The Patriot, as in duty bound, being a party organ, comes to the rescue of Hon. Mr. McKay and Hon. Mr. Graham, two members of the Ross cabinet. We are not likely to agree with the party view of the two gentlemen referred to. Their true color probably lies somewhere between the angelic whiteness which the Liberal journals ascribe to them and the dark colors in which they are daubed by the Opposition blackwash brush.

THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

LETTER FROM HON. GEORGE FORBES.

Sir.—I find that in the issue of the Daily Examiner of Nov. 24th inst. the statement was made in the course of an editorial that I am in open opposition to Premier Peters and the present Government, and also that Mr. Peters had publicly denounced and represented me.

I wish to say with regard to the former statement that it is absolutely untrue. I supported the Federal Government, as formerly, in the recent election and I have supported and will most certainly continue to support Messrs. F. L. Hasard and D. P. Irving, in my own district of Belfast.

While I am not in a position to deny the latter statement, not having heard or read Mr. Peters' speeches to any extent, I can scarcely believe that he would misrepresent me either privately or publicly. My position is a simple one. I decided immediately after the last local election that I would not again be a candidate in this district; that decision was taken because I felt that an arduous campaign, undertaken, as was that of four years ago, even over bad roads, in stormy weather and in a district so close as Belfast, was too great a tax on my health and strength.

As a matter of fact I lay sick in my room for a month, with an illness contracted by that campaign, and the Federal bye-election. That decision then I made known to my friends in Belfast and elsewhere. Furthermore Mr. McCready, Editor of The Charlottetown Guardian so late as eight months ago, asked me if the rumour of my retirement were true. I replied that it was quite true and the issue of The Guardian immediately following an announcement to that effect. The decision I had taken was therefore final, and was not, in fact, could not possibly be affected by anything that has since transpired.

It has been brought to my notice that Conservative canvassers are reporting me in open opposition. I wish once more to brand any such report as absurd and absolutely false. If Premier Peters has misrepresented me and denounced me, all I can say is that I am very much surprised and the announcement in the Examiner of yesterday is the first I have heard of it. If it be true, I care nothing for it as my allegiance is to the great Liberal Party of Canada, and to the principles of Liberalism and neither the one nor the other can be altered by anything that Mr. Peters may say or do.
