"MANIFEST DESTINY."

Since 1835 when the various divisions of British North America set about arranging a scheme of union, Canadian statesmen of various grades have made up their minds that it is the manifest destiny of Newfoundland to become part and parcel of the Dominion. They have clung to this impression with wonderful tenacity. Sir John Macdonald was confident that though the union was delayed he would yet live to see the Dominion rounded out by the admission of Newfoundland. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has since hoped to accomplish the union of the Ancient Colony with Canada. And what is the net result of it all? Simply this, that all the original promoters of union in Newfoundland are dead and buried, and most of the original dreamers of this manifest destiny in Canada also, while the union is apparently further off than it appeared to be forty years ago.

And this serves to recall another chapter of alleged "manifest destiny" that has in very similar fashion remained much longer unfulfilled. It is a far call from 1904 back to 1776, a matter of 128 years in fact, and yet during all that time there have been men of prominence in the United States, in the British Isles and even a few in British America who believed that it was the manifest destiny of these northern Provinces to become a part of the greater North American Republic. And great efforts have been made from time to time to bring it about. By conquest during the Revolutionary War of 1776-83, and again in the War of 1812-14, by every seductive wile of American diplomacy and the American press from time to time; by reciprocity and by hostile tariffs; by meddlesome interference; by chicanery in boundary settlements; by quarrels over the fisheries; by the ceaseless assertion of American public men that such union is inevitable; by the traitorous assertion of leading British statesmen from time to time that such union was probable and even desirable; by like treachery of agitators in Canada during the troublous times of 1837 and 1839—all by these means every possible

effort has been made to consummate the union, and yet to all human appearance the much asserted manifest destiny is farther from accomplishment and less probable ever to be effected than it was in 1776.

Today a calm survey of the entire situation must tend to show that almost nothing in the way of change in national affairs is less probable than the political union of Canada with the United States. It is more possible that the great Republic shall yet become a monarchy than that the American dream of manifest destiny in the way of extension northward should come true. The Republic is coming under the dominion of its plutocrats, and these in turn are pining for hereditary titles and honors which a Republic cannot give. They travel in Britain and continental Europe and find there distinctions which money cannot buy and which seem higher than the mere possession of millions. They feel humiliated that an American millionaire outside of his own country must yield precedence in society or court circles to some century old title or to some five century old patent of nobility. The days of republican simplicity are gone; the days of luxury, pomp and parade have succeeded. The basis upon which the Republic was founded, that all men are born free and equal no longer has an existence in the popular mind. Once there was a belief in America that the world would become a world of republics, and that monarchies would die out. That belief has largely vanished, along with the British belief of sixty years ago that the world must inevitably be converted to free trade. Many widely prevalent illusions as to manifest destiny have already vanished into thin air.
