

SCIENTIFIC LECTURE ON SILVER FOXES

(continued from page 2) France, and not one of these places had a specimen of a Silver Fox. They said when I enquired about them, they were too rare and expensive to be found in a zoo. Seeing some fox skins in a large retail fur store on Rue De La Paix, Paris, I went in and priced them; they asked fifteen thousand francs for the lighter ones and the darker skins twenty thousand francs, that is, three and four thousand dollars respectively. Upon my return to New York I saw in "Revilleon Freres" window, on 4th St., some skins, I went in and they showed them to me and asked \$500 for the lighter color skins and \$2000 for the real dark ones, but they were no such skins as I priced in Paris, and I might say in neither case were the pelts to be compared with those I had seen on Prince Edward Island. There is from 1000 to 2000 Silver Black Foxes in captivity on the Island, and with this small foundation stock to supply the world's demand for this most costly and beautiful fur, it offers an opportunity for investment unequalled by any other industry on this earth today. RARE AND EXPENSIVE.

I am a member of the New York Zoological Society and upon my frequent visits to that city, I never fail to visit our collection of animals in the Bronx Park. We have a swift fox there in the small Mammal House that has been there for 11 years, its pen is not more than 5 ft. square, and when I saw it last January it was in fine healthy condition with a splendid coat of fur. When you realize that a timid nervous animal will live that long in captivity with hundreds of curious people looking at it every day, what might be done, by giving it a more natural condition in a larger pen while it was in Europe last summer, London, also those in Antwerp and Brussels in Belgium and in Paris,
