THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead, Price \$3.00 per acre.

GERMAN CASUALTIES IN MAY 110,956

Losses More Than Doubled Comparison to the Figures Given for April.

LONDON.—The German casualty lists as reported in the German official casualty lists in the month of May followed:

Killed and died of wounds or sickness 22,000. Prisoners and missing, 26,562. Wounded, 62,394. Total, 110,956.

These casualties added to those previously reported, give the following totals since the beginning of the war:

Killed and died of wounds or sickness 1,068,127. Prisoners and missing 557,410. Wounded 2,731,223. Total 4,356,760.

The German casualties as reported in April totalled 42,838, of which the killed numbered 10,979 and the prisoners 4,308.

France May 20, 1917 Miss M. J. Dolron P. E. I.

Dear Friend:—Just a few lines in answer to your request and to thank you very much for the socks which I received. I might say that they came in very handy, in fact socks are a thing that we boys out here appreciate at any time because we have not always got the chance of washing a pair and less time to mend them when they happen to have a hole worn in them.

Well I expect that by this time you are having some nice summer weather or the same as we are having at the present, which of course is a great welcome after so much rain, snow and mud during the winter months and the winters out here are about as long as the winters that we have in Canada, but I would rather have a winter in Canada than out here even though it may be colder. One can get really keen dirt, which is more than a curse for this country. I myself prefer the extra cold to the extra rain, but during the summer the weather is just splendid and one could hardly wish for better. Just now the country round where Fritz has not shelled too heavily is commencing to look like old times again with the nice green grass growing and the trees that have survived are just about full leafed. It sort of carries one back to the old home again.

Well I am afraid that I can not write you a very interesting letter for as to telling you any news re the war and what part we play in it is prohibited so I will have to draw this to a close for this time thanking you again for your kindness.

END POTSDAM GANG PLEADS DR. VAN DYKE

NEW YORK.—The Rev. Dr. Henry Van Dyke, formerly Minister to The Hague, preached Tuesday from his old pulpit at the Brick Presbyterian Church on the hypocrisy of the Kaiser, who referred familiarly to God while employing poison gas, and quoted from the Bible while sending airplanes to kill women and children.

"America must join with the others in ending the Potsdam gang," he said. "If the world is not to become a cage of wild beasts. The gang is against the laws of God. It is using Christianity to bolster up a cause as infamous as men never engaged in."

Dr. Van Dyke started to preach from manuscript, but branched off into an extemporaneous exhortation of Germany and her methods of warfare. He repeatedly used the words "Potsdam Gang," in referring to the German junkies. He said that all the world knew who was responsible for the war, and that it was idle for the Kaiser and his officers to attempt to shift the blame. This attempt at evasion, he said, merely dug the German grace deeper and added to her shame.

"True American kindness brought America into the war," he said, "and it will keep us there until the war is won. Some people worry about Christians being in the war in view of the Sermon on the Mount, but I say there is no need for conscientious people to feel such as have been committed since 1914, the world guards must act and they are right in acting. America in the war at this time is in the right place."

Another patriotic sermon was that preached by the Rev. Christian F. Reiser at Grace Methodist Episcopal Church. The sermon was in the interest of naval recruiting.

The benedictory sermon to the graduating class of Manhattan College was preached last night by the Rev. William P. F. Dooley in the Church of the Annunciation, Convent Avenue and 31st Street. The new church was filled to capacity with the alumni and the friends and relatives of the graduates.

Father Dooley referred to the fact that yesterday was the anniversary of the battle of Bunker Hill, and declared that every man must do all in his power to bring success to the forces of right and justice in the present war.

The Rev. Thomas Mackenzie, pastor of the Dutch Reformed Church of Flushing, spoke at a special patriotic service yesterday. He said:

"We must fight against the enemies of God without and within. And as we thus fight here, he should come—not the loose braided, self-indulgent peace of the man who, because he drifts with the current, is not conscious of any conflict, but the peace of the man who fights bravely the good fight of faith, and is rewarded at the last with the victor's crown."

The service was attended by 1,000 persons.
