Berlenbach's friends insist that he made his greatest mistake when he didn't hire a second like George Engle or Doc Bagley to work behind him. They figured that Hickey, an old veteran, was too excited during the fight and that a cool-headed second could not only have advised the youngster better, but could have brought him around when he was in distress.  
Berlenbach, however, thinks it idle to worry about post-mortems, or draw conclusions about things that might have happened, but didn't happen. He figures wisely, that the mistakes made are beyond recall and that their value rests in the lesson that they should not happen again.  
"The most valuable lesson I learned he said, "is that a fighter has to do a little thinking for himself, that no standard rule or style of fighting can be laid out that will meet every exigency, that a fighter must make his own fight as he goes along and decide quickly what is the right thing to do at the right time.  
"As a result of the lesson I learned, I will never rush out and tear into a fighter again. Dempsey did well at that style of fighting, but he opened himself to attack and he has had several narrow escapes, but he got by because he had learned by experience how to take care of himself and what to do when he was hurt. When I get enough experience I may be able to do the same thing, but until I get that experience I'm not going to try.  
"I'm going right along and I'm going to get there," he said. "I'm going to get Delaney again, and if I fight him, I'll guarantee that I'll never be a sucker again for him or any other fighter."

### Charlie Paddock, World's Famous Sprinter Ran Exhibition in Downpour.

DES MOINES, Ill., April 29.—Charlie Paddock of Pasadena, Cal., the world's fastest sprinter, in the Drake relays today convinced his admirers he is ready to uphold the honors of America in the Olympic games when in a downpour of rain, he ran an exhibition 100 yards in the unofficial time of 9.6-10 seconds equalling the world's record.  
Paddock raced against a trio of freshmen—Phelps and Everingham of the University of Iowa, and Philip Butler—beating them to the tape by at least five yards.

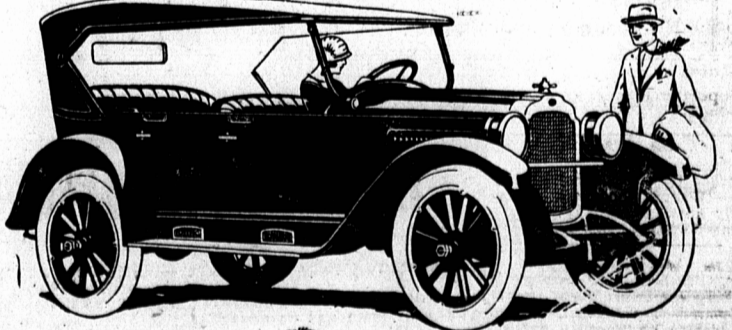
