



CLAIM A CONFESSION IN DYNAMITE ARRESTS


CHICAGO, April 24.—A confession, implicating four men and including the complete story of the wrecking of the Los Angeles Times building and the killing of 21 men on Oct. 1, 1910, is in the hands of the California authorities, according to Detective Burns. The maker of the confession, in addition to the Los Angeles explosion, has told how he and the same

four men have planned and carried out more than a dozen other bomb explosions, resulting in the loss of several more lives and upwards of \$3,000,000 worth of property damage, all the outrages being incidental to labor fights.

The detectives admit using strenuous efforts to get the alleged confession and every method known to the police in the way of "third degree" work and "sweating" was employed. Labor leaders here who heard of the story tonight say that the whole confession is absurd and that when the methods used to obtain it are exposed no one will believe it.

Gertie E. McManigal of Chicago, the structural ironworker, who was arrested in Detroit with J. W. McNamara for the Los Angeles horror, is the author of the story. He told it to Detective William J. Burns and Chicago police officers on April 13, less than 24 hours after he and McNamara were arrested. His recall of the explosions and working of the men covers 90 foolscap pages of typewritten paper.

who was arrested by W. J. Burns in his home city Saturday night, and now is being taken to Los Angeles to face the charge of blowing up the Times building; J. W. McNamara, Cincinnati, O., brother of John J., and "pal" of McManigal, arrested in Detroit, are implicated.

Harry Haplan is now under indictment in Los Angeles as one of the three men who set the bomb which blew up the Times building, but is still at large.

Matt Schmitt, former woodworker in Chicago, is accused with Kaplan and J. W. McNamara in grand jury indictments returned in Los Angeles. Schmitt has not been captured.

The capture of both Haplan and Schmitt is only a question of hours, it was said this evening. W. J. Burns personally is believed to be trailing Schmitt in Ohio, and a dozen operatives of his agency are near Kaplan, who is said to be on the Pacific coast. When they are captured, they will be hurried to Los Angeles and held with the other three prisoners now en route to the California city.

Details of the confession made by McManigal were disclosed today together with the methods used to bring up the spirit of the man, who admits that he is responsible for the death horrors which have only a parallel in the story of the death and destruction told by Harry Orchard concerning the death dealing bombs planted and hurled in the miners' wars in the Coeur d'Alene district.

Every possible method to extract a confession from McManigal was used by Burns before the ironworker, thoroughly worn out, finally admitted his guilt and implicated his alleged confederates. Promises of immunity are said to have been made when the man was first accused, immediately upon his arrival in Chicago on the morning of April 13. He denied all knowledge of the Los Angeles matter. He kept up his stubborn fight against the officers from early morning until after midnight.

ANTI-HOME RULE AMENDMENT MOVED IN BRITISH HOUSE

LONDON, April 24.—The anti-Home Rule amendment to the veto bill proposing to exclude from the operation of the measure "any bill to establish a separate Parliament and executive for Ireland," was moved by John B. Lonsdale, Unionist member for Mid Armagh in the House of Commons today. Whips had been sent out by all parties and in consequence the House was crowded.

In introducing the amendment to the bill intended to restrict the powers of the House of Lords over legislation originating in the first chamber, Lonsdale said he desires to see the question of Home Rule removed altogether from the region of the controversy over the reform of the House of Lords. The Government were at the mercy of the House today, whose object was to smash the constitution, he said, in order to dismember the Empire by driving Ireland into national independence.

James Ramsay MacDonald, Socialist and Labor member for Leith, immediately took the field in support of the Nationalists and contended that the Laborites were wholeheartedly in favor of the devolution demanded for Ireland and believed that the projected "treaty of peace with the United States has been made possible by the promise of Home Rule for Ireland."

SCHOOL CHILDREN'S STABBING AFFRAY.

NEWCASTLE, N. B. April 27.—Nine year old Edward Gundersen stabbed a school-mate named Labretson during a childish quarrel yesterday. Labretson is now in the hospital and Gundersen is under arrest.

McManigal and McNamara were kept in separate rooms, and Burns, his assistants, and the city detectives shot question after question at them for hours.

McManigal was urged to tell the truth because of his wife and little children, and this plea is said finally to have won him over. For seven hours that probably was the early morning of April 14 he continued his story of crime before he declared with drooping head and weakened voice:

"Honest to God, that's all of it."

According to the confessor the gang was concerned in the last year in more than a dozen bomb outrages. He admitted that the late Stephen 100 lives had been the toll of the bomb clan. He declared unhesitatingly that he and the others were well paid for all of the outrages and insisted that Secretary McNamara of the union was the head of the conspiracy.

He told in detail of the long laid and carefully perfected plans made for the destruction of the Times building, but insisted that he was not there—the guilt was according to his confession, being his partner, McNamara, Kaplan and Schmitt. He admitted that he and McNamara had "pulled off" the recent explosions in South Chicago, Milwaukee and Indianapolis.

Once started to telling his story, it seemed apparent to the watching officers that McNamara was anxious to finish it. He spared no one nor did he try to excuse his own acts.

ACCIDENT HOLDS UP BIG DRIVE

NORTH STRATFORD, N. H., April 23.—Its great timbers splintered by the pressure of water and logs above the sluice gate in Stone Dam on the Nulhegan collapsed last night and prevented the rivermen from breaking all records today in starting the front of the big drive down the Connecticut.

Half a million feet were driven down Paul stream into the main river, but practically no logs could be driven down the Nulhegan while the water ran to waste through the open sluice.

Hundreds of logs were sent cascading into the main river above here from the landing, containing 2,000,000 feet, but the water is so low because of the continued cold weather that more of them winged up along the banks in the shallows within the first five miles. The nearest timber suitable for a sluice gate was at Bloomfield, 22 miles away. A telephone message was sent to the Connecticut Valley Lumber Company local agent and within a few minutes Jim Cunningham had the needed material behind a four-horse hitch racing through the black night over the horrible trails caked roads up here. He pulled up his panting horses in the woods and on the mountains a few hours of sunshine will again supply the head of water needed to sluice last winter's record cut from the broops into the main river. Hazing and trying out the mettle of the new recruits by the older rivermen resulted in some amazing feats.

Chic Cote did one trick that stumped every man of the Granby Dam driving crew. He leaped out upon a big log tossing in mid-stream and stabbed his cantlog upright. Then, preventing the stick from spinning over by the grip of his spikes, Chic Cote took off his clothes and hung them piece by piece upon the pitching hat tree. Quite naked to the chill north wind, he rode the dancing log through the white water and bowed acknowledgments to his comrades in cheers. Finally he dressed, shouldered his cant-log and awaited his chance to jump ashore without getting drowned in the rapids.
