Immediately thereafter they proceed to demand and collect the taxes remaining unpaid. Unless the amount is then received by the Collectors they must leave a notice demanding payment within fourteen days. Executions are issued immediately after the expiration of the fourteen days. 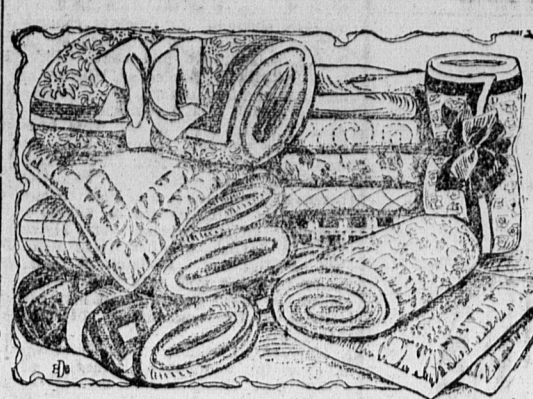

FURNITURE HEADQUARTERS

An announcement which will meet with the approval of the patrons of moving picture houses, here is the fact that the proprietors of the People's Theatre have installed a new Edison machine. Believing that in catering to the best interest of the patrons of the Theatre, the best and clearest pictures are desirable they have secured a machine in which is embodied every feature necessary to eliminate the flickering and sustain a steady and bright presentation of the subjects on the screen. The new Edison machine is equipped with a one pin movement which reduces the flicker, more or less prevalent on the old one—a two pin machine—to at least 50 per cent. It is mainly due to the transition from light to darkness and is caused by the revolving shutter cutting off the light between the projection of successive pictures. In the old or two pin movement the ratio between stop and movement is 3-5 stop and 2-5 movement, or in other words the shutter is cutting off the light 2-5ths of the time. In the new machine the ratio between stop and movement is 4-5 stop and 1-5 movement, or in other words the shutter is cutting off the light 1-5 of the time. Consequently the one pin movement cuts down the flicker the difference between 2.5 and 1-5 permitting the use of a smaller shutter and thereby increasing the illumination, brilliancy and definition of the picture. The Guardian representative last evening saw the pictures produced by the new machine and the improvement was most marked, flickering being minimized and the pictures being much more clearly defined. The enterprise of the proprietors of this popular house in this respect is commendable. They have ever shown a desire to keep their show up to the highest standard of excellence and are repeatedly making some needed change. That the public show their approval of the business methods of the proprietors is rightly evidenced by the crowded houses.
