Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-empt ion patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent of certain conditions.
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth \$5.00. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation on certain conditions.

SHORTAGE OF SHIPS BECOMING MORE MARKED.

LONDON, April 11.—Enquiries made here concerning a possible solution of the tonnage problem now confronting Montreal make it clear that relief from this side is not to be expected, as the shortage of ships becomes more marked daily. An Ontario ship broker, discussing the situation, blamed the Imperial Government for not putting the stevedores and dock laborers under discipline in order to prevent the wasting of time over disputes. He cited an instance where three strikes occurred over the unloading of a ship chartered over him, the vessel being detained several days thereby, and its discharge only effected by him agreeing to the demands of three groups of laborers.

FRENCH GOVERNMENT REGULATES FOOD PRICES

(Special to the Guardian.)
PARIS, April 12.—The French Senate has adopted the principle of fixing by decrees the maximum selling prices of necessities of life. Discussion as to what articles shall be included in the regulations has not yet ended. The Government proposes to fix the prices of the following articles: Bread, milk, meat, butter, imitation butter, eggs, lard, potatoes, sugar, cheese, green vegetables, wine, cider, table beer, fertilizers, petroleum and alcohol for burning purposes. The period of application is for the duration of the war and three months after the cessation of hostilities.

PARIS, April 12.—An official communication tonight says: In Belgium our artillery was active in the region of Langemarck. Between the Somme and Oise our fire shattered trenches west Parvillers in the region of Roye. In Argonne we exploded mines. After grenade fighting we occupied the southern edges of two craters in front of our trenches in the sector of Les Courtes Chaussees. West of the Meuse there was a violent continuous bombardment of Hill 304 and in the region of Fanes and Le Mort Homme. No infantry action occurred during the day.

PETROGRAD, April 12.—An official communication to-day says on the Dvinsk front and south of the Dvinsk region there has been. Cannonading and rifle fighting at various places in the Lubin region southwest of Pinsk our volunteers were successful in engagements with German scouts. North and South of Oitka railway station we repulsed enemy attempts to trench near our trenches. In the Caucasus region our troops continue to wrest positions from the enemy west of Ezerum. In the region of Bitlis we repulsed all enemy attacks. South of lake Urumlah we defeated a Kurd detachment which hastily retreated.
