MONTREAL, June 1—(CP)—The stock market concluded a quiet week on Saturday with trading on a much reduced scale. Utilities showed some strength but industrial, oil and mines were inclined to slip.
 Montreal Power and Brazilian were on the upgrade but Shawinigan dropped fractionally. Steel of Canada issues lost 1-2 each and Cocksuit and Dominion Tar were both behind. Imperial was a loser, in fuel, and Noranda sagged a fraction in mines.
 Among the balance of the small list, World's preferred, in one of its occasional appearances, picked up five points and Wisliss was off a point.
 Total sales: 4,900 shares; Industrials, 2,100; Mines, 2,800.

TORONTO, June 1—(CP)—After lagging through the first hour stocks improved their price tone in the second hour of trading on the Toronto stock exchange Saturday to close with both mining groups and the western oils showing slight index gains. Volume was 65,000 shares.
 Gains of 3 to 5 cents were netted by Conium, Macassa and Pickle Crow. The close was down narrowly for Anor, Bralorne, Teck Hughes and Cochenour Willans. Nickel firmed 1-8 and Pead Oreille added 5 cents against minor recessions for Noranda and Falconbridge.
 Pacalta firmed 1-4, Calmont firmed 1-2, and South End Pete 1-8.

CURRENCIES

NEW YORK, June 1—(CP)—The Canadian dollar firmed 11-16 cents on New York foreign exchange markets during the week ended Saturday, finishing at a discount of 12 1-4 cents in relation to United States currency. It was stationary Saturday at that figure, the closing quotation for Friday also.
 Sterling ended 1-4 cent light for the week, ending at \$4.03 1-4 after opening unchanged from Friday at \$4.04.
 The Hong Kong dollar edged a shade and closed at 24.46 while Shanghai likewise was off a trifle at 5.50.

NEW YORK, June 1—(AP)—You could have put Saturday's stock market in your right eye without bringing on even a slight case of astigmatism.
 So far as prices were concerned, the list stepped out of the week and month with a moderately lower drift although scattered aircraft and specialties managed to emerge with fractional gains.
 Transfers for the two hours of 107,100 shares were the smallest since last Aug. 24, and compared with 160,200 a week ago. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 1/4 of a point at 39.6 and on the week was down 2. For the month the composite was up 4.
 It was one of the narrowest markets in the matter of the number of stocks traded, in two decades or more. Of about 1,260 listed issues, only 345 changed hands, actually a low mark since Aug. 24, when 303 were dealt in. In Saturday's total, 127 were off, 93 up and 125 unchanged.
 Among shares in arrears at the finish of the brief proceedings were U.S. Steel, General Motors, U.S. Rubber, Santa Fe, Chesapeake & Ohio, Westinghouse, Du Pont, Allied Chemical, Eastman Kodak, Standard Oil (N.J.) and American Smelting. Atlantic Refining dipped to a new year's low.
 Consolidated Aircraft touched a new top for 1941. On the upside also were Douglas Aircraft, Boeing, United Aircraft, Lockheed, Sears Roebuck, American Telephone, N. Y. Shipbuilding, J. I. Case and Anaconda.
 Canadian issues were shared in the general stagnation of the market. Only two showed changes. Dome Mines dropping 1-4 and Hiram Walker 1-2.

 midwinter, many of them in this condition early in the season. Because of the low stage of the Rio Grande, many adjacent oxbow lakes, or "bancoas," were dry or nearly so. These were not replenished until March 27, when an early rise of the river level sent water into old channels and other undiked lowlands. The salt-water lagoons west of the barrier ridge contained seepage water from the Gulf of Mexico but were much reduced in area as compared with 1938-39.

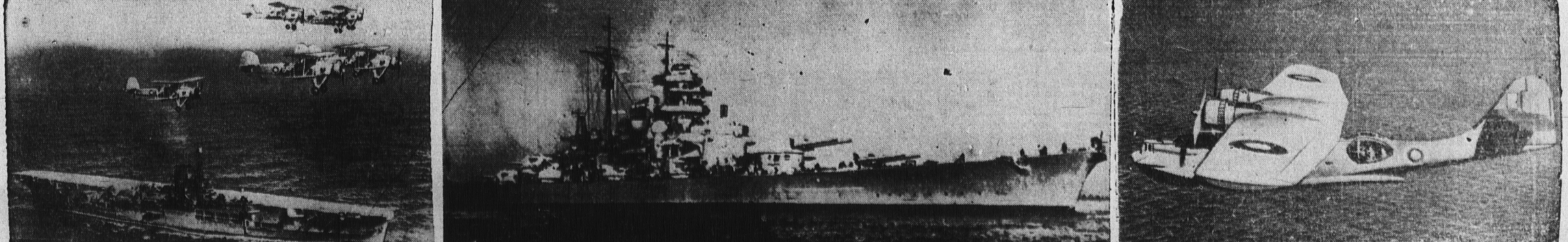

Hood Avenger's Sink Bismarck After 1,200-Mile Chase



Many times "sunk" by Nazi propagandists, the old aircraft carrier Ark Royal (LEFT) was still able to play her part in the battle which sank the Bismarck. Her planes helped find the fleeing ship. Proudly, Berlin released this picture of the 35,000-ton Bismarck (CENTRE), pride of the Nazi battle line, after a lucky hit from one of her guns exploded a magazine and sank the British battle cruiser Hood. The picture reached Canada just in time to illustrate the story of the great war ship's sinking by a British fleet. The U. S. had a part in the victory over the Bismarck. A Catalina scout bomber like this (RIGHT), one of many in Britain's service, located the fleeing warship. The fleet did the rest.
