THE S. S. Bonavista arrived at 3 p. m. on Thursday from Montreal with a large general cargo and a number of passengers. She sailed again at 12 o'clock noon on Friday for St. John's, Nfld, via North Sydney, with a cargo consisting of 13,000 bus. oats, 1,400 bus. potatoes, 83 head cattle, 4 horse, 120 sheep and sundry small freight. Her outward passengers were Miss Bessie Sullivan and Mrs. Hyde.

THE annual meeting of the First Methodist Church for the year ending May 31st, 1901, was held in the basement of the church last evening. Mr. Henry Smith submitted the report of the Quarterly Board, and Mr. W. A. Weeks reported for the Trustee Board. The number of members reported to last Conference was 424. During the year 45 have been received by trial on profession of faith; and 27 have been received by letter, a total of members received during the year of 72. Eleven have received letters of dismissal, two have died, and five names were removed from the list by the Leaders' Meeting in accordance with the Discipline, leaving a total of 470 in full membership and 8 still on trial; making a net gain of 51. The Pastor has baptised 2 adults and 17 infants; attended 6 burials; and solemnized 7 weddings.

THE GUARDIAN has received a copy of the Militia laws of P. E. Island, passed on the third of July 1780. In the provisions are the following: "All male persons, planters, inhabitants and their servants, between the ages of sixteen and sixty, residing in and belonging to the Island shall bear arms and duly attend all musters and military exercises in their respective companies. If any person liable to be enrolled as aforesaid do attempt to exempt himself from such service by shifting from house to house he shall pay a fine of ten shillings. That any alarm which may be given or made at Patterson's Battery in Charlottetown upon such occasions as are reasonable to instruction to be given by the Governor, or Commander in chief for the time being to the officer commanding at the said battery, shall be by setting on fire or lighting a beacon at the summit of the hill on Queen Street or at such other place as the Governor or Commander in chief for the time being shall or may appoint for the purpose, as also by firing two guns like manner at the Tartan's wharf the same to be fired at the space of five minutes. After the firing of the aforesaid gun at the battery, or at such other place as may be appointed. In case of such alarm such persons shall forthwith appear complete with their arms and ammunition. All persons willfully making false alarms shall be fined to His Majesty in the sum of fifty pounds for the support of his Government, or suffer twelve months imprisonment. No captain, master or commander of any vessel riding at anchor, or being within the harbor of Charlottetown or any other person ashore or afloat, shall presume to fire any guns, or small arms, or beat any drum after sun set unless under some lawful occasion, under the penalty of forfeiting forty shillings for every gun or small arm so fired or drum so beaten and upon default offender to be incarcerated in jail until such payments have been made."

## Cheese Board Meeting

The Cheese Board met yesterday morning in the Registry Office. There was quite a large attendance from the different factories of the Island. Mr. Arthur Simpson was elected chairman.

A committee, composed of Theo Robertson, East Point; A. B. Dickieson, New Glasgow and L. McDonald, East Point, was appointed to wait on the Premier, to secure a suitable room for future meetings.

The officers for the ensuing year as appointed are:

The following resolution was moved by L. L. Jenkins, seconded by D. Murchison: Whereas, complaints were made by several secretaries of factories last season, that cheese sold on this board was not inspected in time, and also the cheese was left at the factories too long, to the serious inconvenience of the cheese makers and in some cases serious loss occurred to several factories.

Therefore resolved, that purchasers be required to inspect and remove their purchases within two weeks from date of purchase, unless otherwise arranged by buyer and seller. Carried unanimously.

After the Board closed Mr. Horace Hazard purchased 300 boxes from Vernon River Cheese Factory and 100 boxes from the Hazelbrook factory.
