PALMIST AIDED SLEUTH: SLAYER BREAKS DOWN.

NEW YORK, March 29—The story of how a confession was extracted from Frank E. Heidemann of his murder of little Marie Smith last November near Asbury Park, is as strange as any modern drama.

The detective confided to Heidemann that he had committed a murder in Chicago. Then one day he arranged a fake murder for Heidemann to witness. In their wanderings together, they met a stranger on the outskirts of Yonkers.

But the big moment came last Tuesday night, in Atlantic City, when the detective suggested that, having nothing to do, he and Heidemann visit a palmist. The woman had

been previously coached by the detective. The suspected man went into her room, a dark place, with mysterious drapings.

After narrating a few true details of his life (furnished by the detective) the woman started as though alarmed. "I see strange things," she said in a hollow tone.

"There are woods—with the sea far off. There is a path—here it runs (and she traced a course over Heidemann's palm with her finger.) And over this path I see coming a figure. It is the figure of a girl. A little girl. She is smiling and unafraid. But in the woods a man is lurking. Little girl—be-ware!"

Heidemann was trembling violently, and the fortune-teller could scarcely hold his hand.

DUTCH THEY WERE AND MUST REMAIN

PARIS, March 28—The attempt of the Naundorf family who claim to be descendants of Louis XVI, to obtain a declaration of their French nationality by means of a petition to the senate, has failed.

Such a question there being ample facilities to obtain declarations of nationality in the regular manner through the law courts.

Recently a commission of the French senate adopted a report prepared by Boissy D'Anglas that the matter should be referred to the minister of justice with a favorable endorsement.

This was taken under consideration by the senate which holds that there is no reason that the senate should concern itself with such a question.

RUN DOWN BY AUTO

BOSTON, March 28—While he was running across Beacon Street at the corner of Otter Street yesterday afternoon, Henry G. Powning, Jr., the 12-year-old son of Henry G. Powning of 55 Garrison Road, Brookline, was struck and knocked down by an automobile owned by Frederick C. King of the Hotel Westminister.

The boy was seriously injured and now lies at the city hospital suffering from concussion of the brain, contusions of the back and abrasions of the right hand.

He had just left the Noble & Greenough school at 100 Beacon St. where he is a pupil, and was evidently bound for Boylston Street to get a car to his home.

The automobile, in charge of Carl E. Wyman of 4 Ashford Street, turned the corner and struck the boy, throwing him several feet.

He was picked up and carried across to the school, where he was attended by Dr. H. A. Lothrop. An ambulance was summoned and the boy was taken to the city hospital, while Dr. Lothrop and another physician followed in another automobile.

The boy's mother was out in her automobile when the accident occurred and could not be located until two hours after the accident. She immediately went to the hospital, where her son's name was placed on the dangerous list. The police took the chauffeur's name, but did not hold him.

CLAIMS THAT ALL DOORS WERE OPEN

NEW YORK, March 28—The grand jury threw into action today the machinery for full investigation of the Washington Square fire on Saturday in which 142 lives were lost, by subpoenaing twenty persons to testify in its inquiry to establish the blame; and the board of aldermen paved the way for an ordinance making fire drills compulsory in city factories.

Among the witnesses before the grand jury are Max Blank, one of the proprietors of the Triangle Waist Co., whose employees were the victims, and Joseph Asch, owner of the building. They may testify tomorrow. One hundred and fifty survivors of the tragedy also will be summoned and examined.

The fire marshal continued his examination of witnesses today; the work of identification eliminated from the morgue all but twenty bodies of the victims and scores of funeral trains wended their way through Manhattan's little Italy and the Jewish section of the East Side.

Such were the chief developments of the third day since the fire. In addition an aldermanic committee was instructed to draft a bill for presentation to the legislature, placing the installation and maintenance of fire escapes on buildings solely under the jurisdiction of the fire department. There, Chief Croker said, it should have rested all the while.

Chief Croker declared for fire escapes on all buildings, fire proof and otherwise. The proposed ordinance requiring compulsory fire drills was left with the rules committee. Incidentally the aldermen inventoried their unenforced commands and found an order to the Manhattan superintendent of buildings, "to report any dangerous conditions which may exist by virtue of inadequate legislation and which may cause loss of life by fire."

The order was issued shortly after twenty-six girls had lost their lives in a fire at Newark, N. J., on November 26 last.

Subpoena services brought before Fore Marshal Beers, a machinist named Greenspan, who said he "screamed and runned" from his post on the 9th floor when the flames began their sweep through the building. The doors swung open to his tugging, he said, contrary to the marshal's belief that they were locked and barred. Greenspan said he escaped by the roof, taking no one with him, although girls grasped his garments as he ran. "It was too dark," he said, "to aid them."

TRIED HYPNOTISM ON COLLEGE MATES

PENNINGTON, N. J., March 29—Harold Heath, nineteen years old, a student in Pennington Seminary here, was expelled on Wednesday last, following an investigation by the faculty into charges made by several pupils that Heath had attempted to practice hypnotism. Details of what the investigation brought forth have been withheld by the faculty, but it is reported that a pupil named George Pratt, a close friend of Heath, had experienced strange delusions while under hypnotic influence.

Young Heath was a member of the junior class, and until last fall had been one of the brightest pupils in the seminary. His home is in Kingston, Jamaica, but at present he is with a sister who lives in Philadelphia. As a member of a literary and debating society in the school Heath became interested in hypnotism last fall, when he read a paper on Psych Phenomena. During the winter the young man spent much of his time reading books on the subject and experimenting, according to statements made by the fellow pupils to the faculty investigating committee.

Several pupils, among them George Pratt, took part in some of the hypnotic experiments, according to statements told to the professors. These experiments were held in the boys' dormitory rooms, and it is stated, the pupils would take turns acting the role of "subject." Pratt it is said, responded more often than the others to the experimenter's suggestion.

During an experiment more than a week ago Pratt suddenly became ill and faint. Alarmed, his friends attempted to revive him from his stupor, but subsequently were forced to call in outside help, and in this way it is reported an account of what the group had been doing reached the faculty.

Dr. Frank McDaniel, President of the Seminary, was attending the New Jersey conference at Atlantic City and was called back to the school by his assistants in order that he might direct the investigation. More than twenty pupils were questioned concerning the hypnotic experiments and on Wednesday Heath was expelled from the school.

In the absence of Dr. McDaniel, who had gone to New York, Mr. Perry, the Vice-President, said tonight: "We found it necessary to dismiss Mr. Heath because of his continued bad conduct and laxity in his studies. For months he had been a trouble maker among the boys. It is true that we found out that he had been excited over becoming a hypnotist, but it was not for this reason that we expelled him."

WILL BE A FAMINE IN EASTER LILIES

NEW YORK, March 28—There is to be a famine in Easter lilies this year. The crop, according to wholesale florists here, is only about one-third as large as last season. This applies to the production on American soil. The quantity of flowers that comes from Bermuda for the Easter trade is small compared to the quantity used. Steamship companies declare that comparatively few Easter lilies will be imported this year, probably not more than 10,000 in all.

Last season the total sales by New York wholesalers reached 5,000,000 blossoms.

BOSTON, March 28—That United States Senator W. Murray Crane is voting against unseating Senator William Lorimer of Illinois was announced by a resolution adopted yesterday by the Boston Congressional ministers by a vote of 38 to 21.

THE LIMITATION OF ARMAMENTS.

BERLIN, April 1—The Reichstag, by a large majority yesterday, rejected the Socialist motion calling upon the Government to take immediate steps leading to an international agreement concerning the Universal Limitation of Armaments and the abolition of the Right of Capture at sea.
