Laws and Reg- ulations In Devel- oping Trade

Address prepared by Mr. G. H. Clark, Dominion Seed Commission N. R. O., Ottawa, by the Radio Markets Service of the Department of Agriculture.

During the last fifty years, particularly during the last twenty-five years, governmental regulation of trade steadily developed until now any trader in general produce must be conversant with as many laws as the different kinds of produce in his warehouse.

In our Department of Agriculture we have to administer more than fifty of these laws. Our grandfathers who were farmers in Canada were probably not in need of these laws. They did not make a strong demand for them. They were not well organized, as are the farmers of today. Then again, fifty years ago a comparatively small proportion of the people of Canada made their living by farming the farmers. The manufacture and the wholesale and retail trade associations were not then organized.

The development of laws and regulations to govern trade has been necessary in large part in order to proper basing of quality standards for the different kinds of produce, and in order properly to adjust disputes that continually arise as between the farmers and the traders.

The utility value of seeds, feeding stuffs and fertilizer; cannot be determined by casual examination. With these commodities it is very easy for the unscrupulous trader to put one's eye on the unsuspecting farmer. Farmers have learned from hard-earned experience that the inferior qualities are, as a rule, too expensive at any price. Before legal quality standards were established, the best that was produced in Canada was exported to other countries where quality standards were enforced, and Canada's inferior grades of seeds, feeding stuffs and fertilizers that could not be sold under the regulations of other countries.

Twenty-five years of experience has shown that when sold on the basis of fixed standards of quality our farmers will strive to produce the best grade of seed and fertilizer for their own use.

Manufacturers of feeding stuffs know that when their feed has to be labelled, showing perhaps that it contains oat hulls, farmers will not buy. Before the present law was enacted, shorts and other feed- ing stuffs of commerce were commonly composed of forty per cent or more by weight of finely ground oat hulls and elevator screenings, the presence of which could be detected only in the laboratory.

The nitrogen and potash contents of many of the cheap mixed fertilizers on the market were of no value to the farmer or gardener, because they could not be dissolved.

If Canada were for one year to set aside the regulations which govern agricultural produce, the world soon would become flooded with the dregs of the trade, rejected by the laws of other countries.

The Seeds Act, the Feeding Stuff Act and the Fertilizer Act treat with commodities that are changeable in quality and character from season to season depending on climatic conditions or on the nature of the by-products of industries. In consequence, these laws prescribe only the main basis and leave the details of standard- ization to be determined by regulation. These regulations are pre-

pared and revised each year by an advisory board composed of from nine to fifteen persons who are elected by the various interests they represent. There is a separate advisory board for each law. The members of these boards receive no remuneration for their services. Approximately one-half of the members represent farmers' organizations and the other half the manufacturing and trading interests directly concerned.

The Advisory Board under the Seeds Act has just concluded its annual meeting. The standards made by the board a year ago were so high that only about seven per cent of our Canadian grown red clover seed could be cleaned to grade No. 1. The standards for germination caused more than twenty-five per cent of the seeds of carrot, parsnip, celery and similar seeds imported into Canada to be rejected at ports of entry and returned to the countries of origin. In Canada we do not produce our own field root and garden seeds in quantity for commerce and we have received an intimation from prominent seed growers of other countries that they must in future decline to take the risk of shipping seed to Canada and having it returned. The advisory board agreed that inasmuch as a supply of these seeds cannot be produced to fit in to the regulations, it was necessary to amend the regulations so as to fit into the seed supply.

Our system of seed control in Canada is probably more far-reaching than that of any other country. The foundation for our supply of home-grown seeds is produced by our Canadian plant breeders. The elite stock seed they have for distribution is new and old varieties, is multiplied by farmers who make a specialty of seed growing as members of the Canadian Seed Growers' Association. Their seed crops are inspected in the field at a cost to them of 15 cents per acre and if sufficiently pure and good the seed crop is registered. The threshed and cleaned seed is finally inspected, graded and sealed in the sack at a cost of 3 cents per bushel to the grower. This system for the encouragement of seed production in Canada has, under the guiding direction of Mr. Leonard Newman, Dominion Cerealist, yielded an abundant supply of seed grain of all the best standard varieties. Dr. McRostie, the Dominion Specialist in grasses and clovers, is making splendid progress in the develop- ment of a seed supply of the super- ior grades of pure variety seeds of alfalfa, red clover, timothy, mangels, turnips and other kinds of seeds. Mr. W. T. Macoun, Dominion Horticulturist, and his staff, with the co-operation of provincial plant breeders, is creating a supply of selected strains of the best varieties of garden beets, carrots, onions, sweet corn and other garden vegetables which are calculated to fit into the particular needs of mar- ket gardeners about Ottawa, Mon- treal, Toronto, Winnipeg and other Canadian cities and also the needs of the average amateur gardener. These field root and garden vegeta- ble seeds are now being supplied in limited quantities by about 150 well experienced seed growers in British Columbia, where the climatic conditions are particularly favourable to the production of garden seeds.

The making of laws and regula- tions and the enforcing of them form the lesser part of the work of the Seed Branch. The construc- tive work, including the educa- tional work, is regarded as by far the most attractive and most ex- pensive part of the work undertaken by the Branch. The officers of the Seed Branch in all parts of Canada have earned the well merited re- putation of being energetic and ef- ficient. The interested public are invited to avail themselves of their services. The district headquarters of the staff are located at Truro, Quebec city, Ottawa, Toronto, Win- nipeg and Calgary.

Spain Calls Up Exempted Men

MADRID, Oct. 25.—The opera- tions of relieving the Larache sec- tor continue. Official reports claim that the operations are developing normally. The main topics are the relief of Buharraz and descriptions of the five weeks' siege are now being published. The details are harrowing, yet give but a vague idea of the sufferings and heroism of the Spanish troops.

Whatever the Moorish losses were it is admitted that the Span- ish losses were naturally heavier, particularly in taking the key posi- tion of Cudia Magar. It is signifi- cant that what are described as "political overtures" were made to facilitate the evacuation without re- fusing the bargain, and having se- zed the water supply, called up- on the Spanish commander of Buharraz to surrender, which he refused to do.

Gen. Primo de Rivera has re- cently described the task as cruel and costly. All classes are suffer- ing, well-known names of the aris- tocracy appearing in the casualties. A new decree calls the men of the '19, '20, '21, '22, and '23 classes who have hitherto been exempted from service by money payments. The wealthier classes had hitherto been exempted from military con- scription and many hardships of con- tinued fighting which were borne by the poor, and this decree goes some way to abolish this in- justice. The new classes will prob- ably remain in reserve in Spain.

Facing Arrest Tries Suicide

ZUCHAREST, Rumania, Oct. 25.—Discovery of an extensive or- ganization for the issuance and sale of bogus passports to the United States resulted yesterday evening in the attempted suicide of General Viaticano, brother of the member of the Rumanian Cabinet, and today threatened a Cabinet shake up.

The passport frauds were re- vealed by the United States consul in Cherbourg, France, who re- ported there were irregularities in the papers of Rumanians attempt- ing to board steamers for the United States. His reports resulted in the unearthing of an elaborate scandal and prompted the Ruman- ian authorities to order the arrest last night of General Viaticano. When an attempt was made to take him into custody, however, he shot himself, and was taken to a hospi- tal, where it was said his condition was grave.

The scandal is considered in poli- tical circles as certain to result in the resignation of the general's brother and the reorganization of the Cabinet, particularly since other Cabinet members are reported to be involved.

Girl Decoy Fears Gang's Vengeance

NEW YORK, October 25.—Prot- esting "the gang" would shoot her if they got her back in Boston, Hel- en Penrose, arrested last night, was arraigned today in First Criminal Court, Jersey City, before Justice Leo Sullivan on charges of having extorted \$60,000 from Victor Sear- les, Boston millionaire, on June 1, 1920. She was held in jail in de- fault of \$25,000 bail.

The girl, who the police say is Mrs. Abraham Levy, and whose age they give as twenty-four, col- lapsed at the mention of extradition proceedings. She was arrested on a warrant forwarded here by At- torney-General Mitchell of Mass- achusetts.

At headquarters, it was said the girl had admitted guilt in the Searles charge, and also had con- fessed to having played a part in the difficult case involving William J. Corcoran, former district attor- ney of Middlesex county, Mass- achusetts.

She declared she had come to Jersey City, officers said, to live down her past and make a new start in life.

MEXICAN COMMUNITY OF 10,000 TERRORIZED BY SWARM OF LOCUSTS

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 25.—Ten thousand inhabitants of Tierra Blanca, in the State of Vera Cruz, are being terrorized by a swarm of locusts more than four miles long. The straw roofed houses are being eaten up and one dispatch says a farmer, lying intoxicated in a field, had his feet eaten off by the pests. Southern Mexico has suffered a grasshopper plague for three months and many trains have been derailed by slippery rails, caused by the crunching of thousands of the small bodies under the wheels.
