HALIFAX, Feb. 25 — (CP) — Brought to hospital here from the Magdalen Islands last August, 20-month-old Allen Carl MacLean died today of meningitis.

The boy was brought by the R. C. M. P. cutter French to Pictou, N. S., then by taxi to children's hospital here Aug. 26. He was accompanied on the mercy trip by his father, leading stoker A. C. MacLean of Entry Island, Magdalen Islands, a member of the crew of the aircraft carrier Mag-nificent.

This last petition was uttered the night before he died.

This is one of his golden sentences: "To travel hopefully is better than to arrive, and the true success is to labour."

He was verily a "diffuser of life."

Another such character was Henry Drummond. It was said of him that when he entered a room it was as if an additional candle was lighted — that the very temperature seemed changed. He diffused life to the students of Edinburgh university. He told people that oftentimes he felt as if he should change his clothes after hearing about the life some of his hearers lived. "Broken earthenware" was put together again.

When Phillips Brooks died, a little child said to her mother, "Won't the angels be glad?" He used to go to homes where the mother had lots to do and not much chance of going out for even a walk and he would keep the children while the hard-worked mother sought the open spaces of the crowded city.

But when we think of those who have suggested life and inspired it, we at once think of our Master, Jesus Christ, for he was always telling people how to live. He said that he came "that we might have life and have it more abundantly. On the old pagan world of his day disgust and secret loathing fell, it was sick and ready to die. He took a dozen men and taught them and left the world in their keeping when He died. It was true in His case that "one loving heart sets another heart on fire." Their conduct very early suggested that they had been with him.

The world owes a great deal to its humorists — those who make us laugh. We have known those who relished the jokes in the newspaper as much as anything in it. Why even the Bible tells us that "a merry heart doeth good like a medicine." (Proverbs 16:22.) I close with these verses from Ella Wheeler Wilcox: "Laugh and the world laughs with you. Weep, and you weep alone; For this brave old earth must borrow its mirth, But has trouble enough of its own."

Did you see a man who wrote the "Sticket Minister" and dedicated it to me, in words that brought tears to my eyes every time I look at it? — where about the graves of the martyrs the whaups are crying.
