WEEKLY REVIEW OF THE STOCK MARKET FURNISHED BY ROSS CAMERON & CO.

November 29, 1902. THE SITUATION. Several unfavorable factors developed in the situation the past week which have caused some uneasiness to operators for higher prices, namely, the heavy selling of securities for foreign account; the strength of sterling exchange, which indicates moderate shipments of gold; fears of a rupture between the Gould Hawley-Harriman interests which if it develops seriously is likely to bring disastrous results to the stock market; the convening of Congress, with the President's message urging legislation antagonistic to trusts and monopolies, have all combined in causing further liquidation and the bears have followed up their successes with large sales for the short account. The inside manipulative interests have been contented to support their specialities on a scale down. The present weakness is discounting the unfavorable features, and when they become facts the market will be found to be on bottom. The month of November has been disappointing owing to unfavorable developments arising which were unexpected to many. Sentiment is extremely bullish and this alone is a bull argument. Our advice is to hold long stocks, and although it may take a little courage to buy, we feel confident that ultimately you will be well repaid. Favorable developments are expected in several quarters that will cause the market to improve materially.

Banks will receive large remittances from the South and West which will tend to ease up the money situation. A firm money market is likely however until after the first of the year.

Railroad earnings continue to show favorably and many roads are now obliged to refuse business as they have not the facilities to handle it. The Pennsylvania Railroad has their lines blockaded with freight, and their employees are working night and day to relieve the congestion. Facts of this character must eventually have a favorable effect upon values.

THE RAILROADS. The bull movement in St. Paul was forecasted in these letters and the stock sold at 18 1/2. Our advice was to wait a good recession and then buy it. It reacted some 6% and has been quite erratic. This stock is the barometer of the market and will bear close watching. Standard Oil interests intend to advance it sharply again, and purchases are in order on every recession. It is expected that action will be taken on the new stock issue the coming week, and it should have a substantial advance in consequence. The weakness in Missouri Pacific and Union Pacific is ascribed to the selling by Gould and Harriman, of their holdings in each other's properties, owing to their reported personal differences. They will undoubtedly adjust their grievances, as the results would be far too serious. These stocks will both do to buy on every recession, especially Union Pacific, as earnings warrant increased dividends the coming year and its future prospects are of the brightest. Canadian Pacific report an increase in earnings for the second week in November of \$101,000 and since July 1, \$1,015,000. This excellent showing is undoubt

edly accountable for the strength of the stock. Liquidation of small accounts has placed it in the strongest of hands. It recovers with ease from every drive by bear interests and a good sized short interest has developed. When the market turns we look for a substantial advance and purchases made on every weakness should prove most profitable. Louisville & Nashville has done nothing as yet but the same excellent buying conditions and we look for good results from purchases now made.

The new Rock Island securities have shown great activity since listed. The preferred stock has shown marked strength. The manipulation will be to make a board market for them and encourage buying by investors and speculators. They will prove good trading stocks and can be bought for the present on every recession. Predictions are freely made that they will advance from 10 to 15 points higher in the near future.

In the medium priced stocks we suggest the purchase of M. K. & T. Com. and Frer., Chicago & Alton and Chicago & Great Western. Good profits should be shown in the near future from purchases made on moderate margins.

For some time past we have advised the sale of the Coal Stocks on every rally, good opportunities have been offered and good profits would have resulted. We suggest continuing in this line of action.

MISCELLANEOUS. Manhattan has continued to be the feature on the long side. The final deal has now been announced, and rights will be given stockholders that will be worth from \$10 to \$12. The stock will probably be kept strong pending this issue. It is high enough under present conditions.

We suggest selling on strong spots and buying on a good decline. Our advice is to sell Metropolitan and B. R. T. on every rally.

The decline in Sugar is a manipulative movement to influence Congress in legislation in their favor. Sentiment is extremely bearish on it, and some sensational movements will be witnessed in the near future.

The holdings of the stocks have become concentrated into few hands. The earnings are said to be very large with a surplus at the present time amounting to some \$10,000,000. They have undoubtedly acquired a large interest in the beet sugar industry. The foundation is now being laid for a big advance later on. Our advice is to buy it on every weakness. In the past, large profits have always been shown on purchases made at this level. Hold your long stock.

Following the advice contained in our Daily and Weekly Letters on C. F. & I., large profits have resulted. A good margin is required to operate in it, as sensational movements take place from time to time. As the time draws near for the meeting we advise conservatism and on a good rally around 90 close out your stock and await developments.

FACTS ONTARIO REFERENDUM

Voting—Thursday, Dec. 4th. Question on ballot:—Are you in favor of the bringing into force of the Liquor Act of 1902? Number of votes in the affirmative necessary to bring law into force, 212,723, providing that number is a majority of the votes polled.

When effective—May 1, 1904, if necessary vote is polled by prohibitionists. Those entitled to vote—Lists to be used are those of the last provincial election, an exception being made of persons who since that time may have ceased to be residents of the province.

Meaning of liquor Act of 1902—It prohibits the sale of liquor within the province, except by licensed druggists, but does not prohibit the manufacture and export, or sale by manufacture to druggists.

Ontario Plebiscite, Jan. 3, 1894—For prohibition, 192,488; against 110,720. Dominion Plebiscite, Sept. 29, 1896—For prohibition 278,380, against 261,663, in Ontario for 154,498, against 115,284.

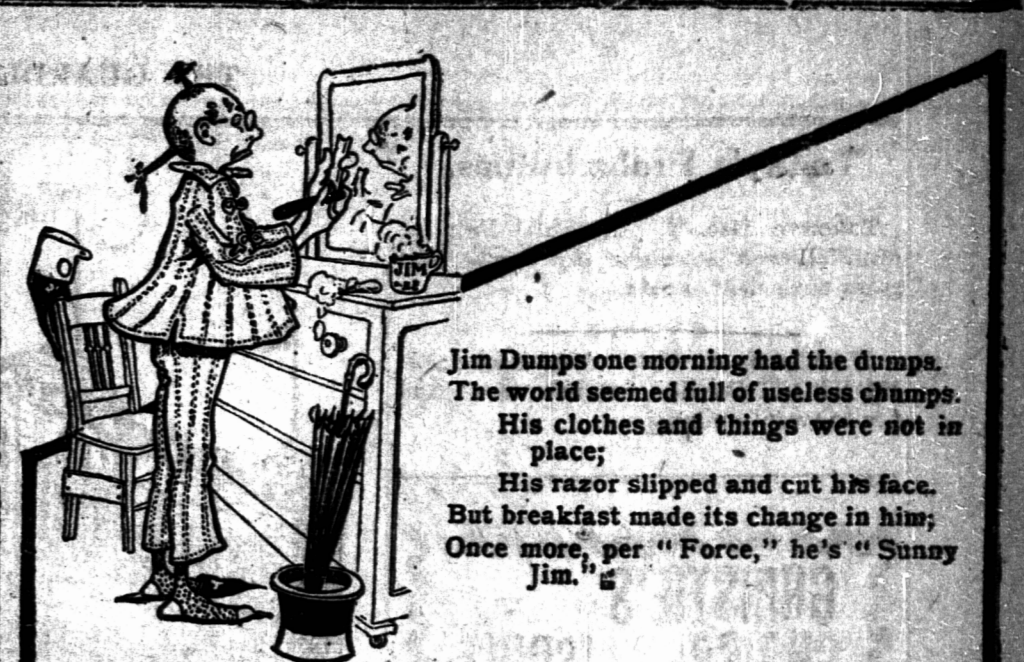

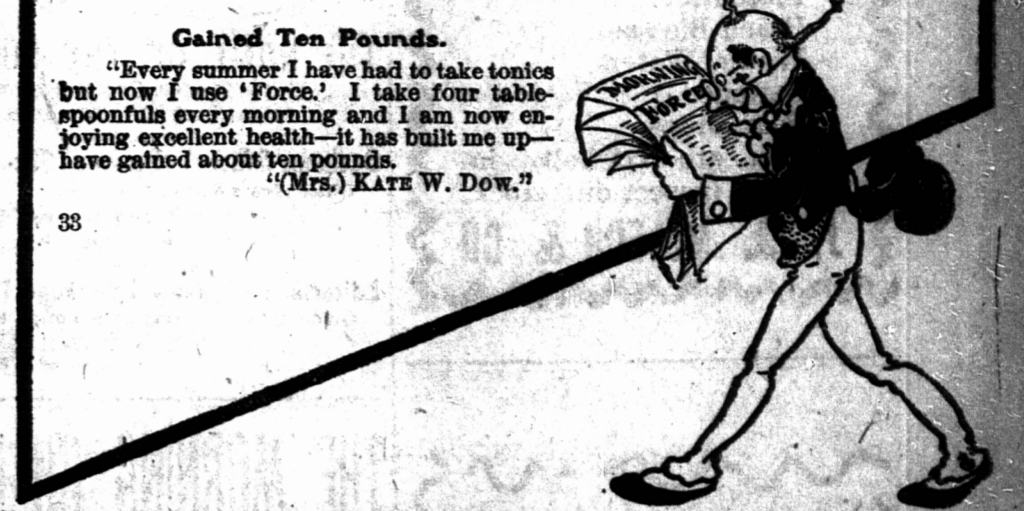

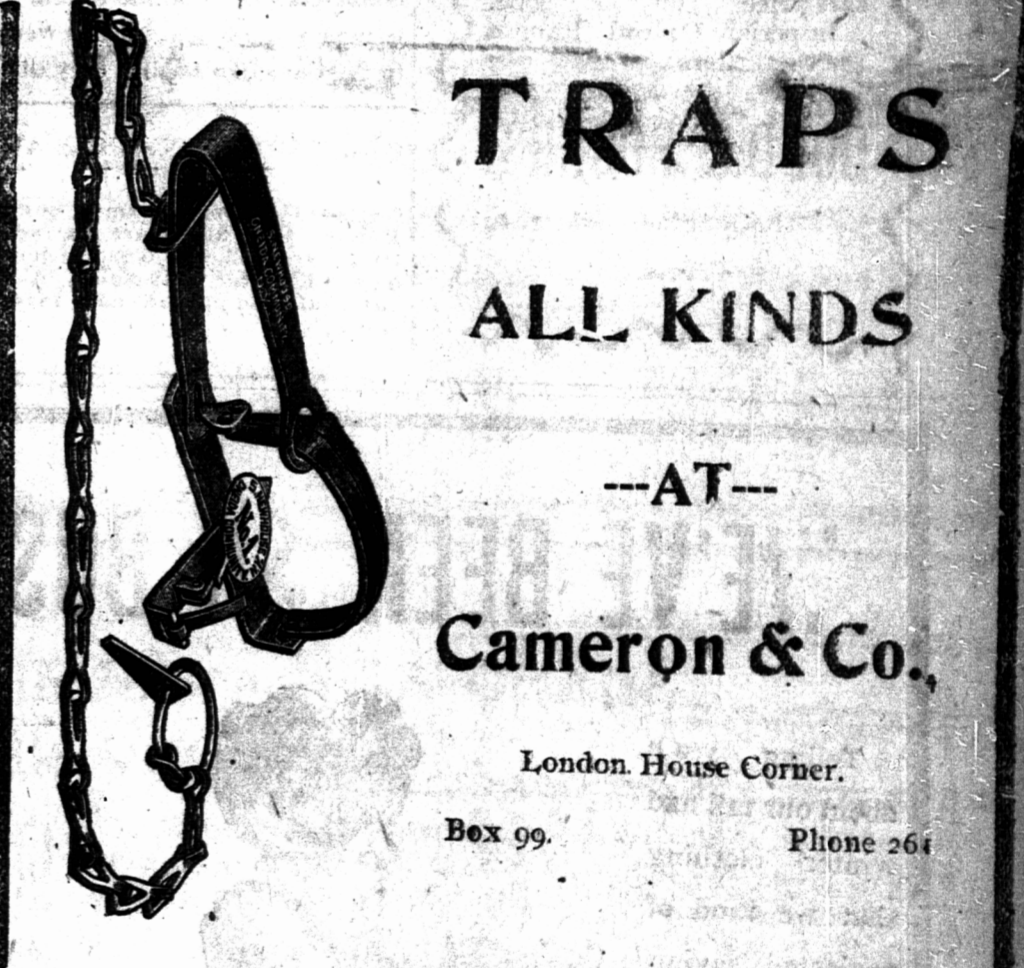
