THE S. S. Lunenburg will run an excursion from Pictou to Charlottetown, on Saturday, September 2nd, leaving here on the arrival of a special train from New Glasgow about 8 o'clock. Rev. C. B. Rev. J. A. Gordon preached his farewell sermon at the Main street Baptist church last Sunday evening before a large congregation that completely filled the sacred edifice. The church was prettily decorated and the music was of special and appropriate character. Rev. Mr. Gordon briefly reviewed his six years' pastorate, pointing out that when he assumed control the membership, now 618, was 427. The additions by baptism were 209 and by letter 107. The church property valuation six years ago was \$5,000 and today \$27,000. The money raised during the six years for current expenses was \$48,180, an increase of about 400 per cent, and for benevolent purposes the church had contributed about \$2,000. The growth of the Sabbath school had been equally marked, the membership, now about 500, was 235 when he took charge. The feeling which had prompted him six years ago to take up the work in this struggling church now prompted him to accept the call to Montreal.

Mrs. J. T. McKenzie, Buffalo, who accompanied the remains of her husband to the Island last week, leaves for home this morning.

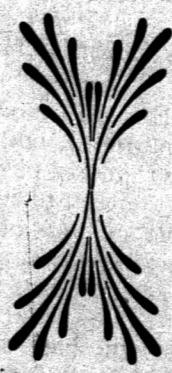
