IN MEMORIAM

MR. ROBERT HOGG It was with sincere regret that we and the citizens in general learned some few days ago of the death of Robert W. Hogg of Sherbrooke, Quebec, son of the late Robert and Jessie Hogg of Charlottetown, P. E. I. Mr. Hogg had been in New York on business in connection with the McCaskey Register Co., for whom he was salesman, and was on his way to Boston, when suddenly stricken on June 7th, and his spirit passed to the God who gave it on Wednesday, June 11th.

Robert or "Bob" as he was known to all his friends, was of a genial disposition, and had the happy faculty of retaining his friends to the end. He removed from Charlottetown early in life and settled in Sherbrooke, Quebec, where he carried on a Manufacturers Agency till the outbreak of the war when he answered the call of his country, and enlisted with the Air Force. After demobilization he again took up his old work, and had been connected with the McCaskey Register, both in Canada and the United States and for some time prior to his death he held the position of manager of the New England Division, Cash Register Sales, previous to which he was sales manager for Canada for the same company. The funeral took place from his home in Sherbrooke, 28 Melbourne St., where a short service for the family was held at 2.45 p. m., the service at the church taking place at 3 o'clock, both being conducted by the Rev. G. E. Reid, Pastor of the Congregational Church, in interment taking place at the Sherbrooke Cemetery, where all that was mortal of him was laid to rest by the side of his wife, and daughter who predeceased him some years ago. One son John, and two brothers, William of Charlottetown and George Russell of Sherbrooke, Quebec, are left to mourn the loss of a father and brother. BLADE OF GRASS IN MAN'S EYE

LONDON, June 26.—Hayseed blew into a man's eye and caused grass to grow there. This astonishing fact is vouched for by doctors at Gloucestershire Royal Infirmary. A farm worker, having something in his eye which caused pain, went to the hospital for an operation. The surgeon made an incision above the eye and found a green blade of grass an inch and a half long. He also found a hayseed. Apparently the hayseed had become lodged in the corner of the socket and discharge from the tear duct watered it and light had reached the seed through the eyeball sufficient to make the grass green.
