DEAN CRITICIZES CHURCH EQUALITY

(By The Canadian Press) EDINBURGH, July 28 - Very Rev. Charles L. Warr, Dean of the Thistle and Chapel Royal, said in a speech here Presbyterianism's doctrine of equality now is "a mere fiction and pretence".

The Moderator of the General Assembly, with his chaplains and the rest, had been exalted into "a kind of national archbishop," said Dr. Warr. The Church of Scotland had departed from the idea that all ministers, as regards their status, stood in a position of complete equality.

"The doctrine that all men are equal has never worked in this world and never will," he asserted, "and it was not likely that it would work in the church."

PROBE SHOOTING

(C.P.-Havas, By Guardian's Special Wire) WARSAW, July 28 - An inquiry into the shooting of two Poles by Soviet frontier guards was expected to be begun by Polish authorities following a call by one of the secretaries of the Soviet Embassy at the foreign ministry today. On June 28th, 1937, there passed away a man widely and favorably known in the south eastern part of the province, in the person of John R. McRae, of Cherry Valley.

He was born at Lot 60 in 1865. A son of the late James and Sarah (Campbell) McRae. His grandfather, Donald McRae was one of the pioneers who came from Scotland on the ship "Polly" in 1803.

For many years he carried on farming and operated a mill at Roseberry, where he was very successful in business. In 1895 he married Miss Janetie Martin of Belle River, who survives him.

In 1929 on account of failing health he retired from business and moved to Cherry Valley, buying a farm property there, where the family since resided. In his new home, as in his native place, Mr. McRae was a highly respected citizen. Of a genial nature and of a kind and hospitable disposition he made many friends. Despite suffering from a painful ailment he was well informed and a good conversationalist. As a younger man he belonged to St. John's Presbyterian Church, Belfast, where he was a trustee of the church. At Cherry Valley he supported the local United Church. In his young days he took an active interest also in the Masonic Order.

Besides his wife, he leaves to mourn their loss, a son John, who with his family resided on the homestead; also a brother Richard, at Point Prim. A much beloved daughter, Marion, predeceased him in 1931 at the age of twenty.

The funeral took place from the home on June 28th, and the very large attendance bespoke the high regard in which he was held by all who knew him. Rev. A. S. Weir conducted the service. Interment took place in Cherry Valley Cemetery.

The sincere sympathy of friends in many places is respectfully extended to the bereaved family.
