Butter Export Stabilization Scheme.—Further assistance to Canadian dairymen is the aim of the Butter Export Stabilization Scheme just officially approved. Statistics indicate that the stocks of butter in storage on September 1, 1935, were approximately 8,500,000 pounds in excess of the five-year average and as the current production is larger than last year, further increases in the surplus will be the result unless some action is taken.

The purpose of the scheme is to facilitate the export of butter to the United Kingdom, where, at the present time, it appears a favourable market exists. This action is intended to relieve the butter market in Canada and, in so doing, strengthen the price of butter fat sold in milk and cream by dairymen throughout the Dominion.

The scheme provides for the marketing or the regulation of the marketing of butter for export. Agencies may be designated through which the butter is to be marketed. Where necessary, exporters may be compensated for losses incurred through export transactions.

The scheme will be administered by a local board consisting of J. F. Singleton, Dairy and Cold Storage Commissioner, Dominion Department of Agriculture, who will be Chairman of the Board; L. D. Wilgress, Director, Commercial Intelligence Service, Dominion Department of Trade and Commerce, and Allan C. Fraser, Ottawa, Secretary-Manager of the National Dairy Council.

Alaska Got News Airplane Crash Via London

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 30.—Stories of telegraph dispatches being detoured half way round a continent during a serious breakdown of direct communication has its counterpart in connection with the breaking of news in the north country concerning the fatal accident which happened to Hollywood's screen star and America's famous aviator recently. It fell to the lot of a powerful short-wave London, England, station to give residents of Skagway, Alaska, the news of the death of Will Rogers and Wiley Post, according to L. B. Jones, general agent for the Canadian National Steamships in Alaska, who has returned to Vancouver with the conclusion of the tourist season in the north. Mr. Jones explained that long-wave reception was very poor in Alaska on that particular day and the powerful United States stations were not coming through immediately after the disaster. The Skagway folk, when Jones makes his headquarters, were therefore using their short-wave sets to pick up what they could in radio broadcasts, with the result that they found the London, England, station and were most grateful for the half-hour program the British station devoted to the famed pair.

International Commission Of Agriculture. The International Commission of Agriculture which embraces the International Union of Agricultural Associations representing agriculture in all parts of the world held its general assembly at Brussels and Gembloux, Belgium, recently. The League of Nations, the International Labour Office, the International Institute of Agriculture, and the International Co-operative Alliance were represented, together with 110 delegates from various agricultural organizations in different parts of the world. The three principal questions before the Commission were the organization of agricultural production under planned economy, the edible fats problem, and the limitation of pig breeding and fattening, with reference to the special pig breeding attempt being made in Denmark and Holland.

Georgetown, or Demerara as it is sometimes called, the "El Dorado" of Sir Walter Raleigh and the colony of which it is the capital, is the only British possession on the west continent of South America. Liver Extract Used In X-Ray Treatment. ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 30.—By means of a liver extract the usefulness of the X-ray in healing can be radically increased, Dr. W. Edward Chamberlain, of Philadelphia, announced yesterday at the 38th annual meeting of the American Roentgen Ray Society here. The new development is used to counteract the "Roentgen sickness" which is found in the case of about 30 per cent of patients. This involves vomiting and nausea, and takes place before the full prescribed dosage of X-ray radiation has been completed. In many cases it becomes difficult, inadvisable or impossible to give the proper amount of treatment, Dr. Chamberlain said.

IN MEMORIAM. MRS. MURDOCH MACKENZIE. In the passing of Mrs. Murdoch MacKenzie, Lyndale, on Sept. 23rd at the age of eighty-nine, the congregation of Valleyfield lost one of its oldest and most loyal members. The late Mrs. MacKenzie, nee Annie Stewart, was born in Culna Cnoc, Skye, Scotland, in 1846 and emigrated to this country with her parents and three sisters, Flora, Catherine, and Margaret, on the ship "Elizabeth" in the year 1863. She attended a Gaelic school in Skye and was well versed in her native language. In 1876 she married Murdoch MacKenzie, Grand View, the ceremony being performed by the Rev. Alexander Munro, Mr. MacKenzie died in 1917. Mrs. MacKenzie came into the membership of the Church on profession of faith in 1887 and for forty-eight years she was a faithful attendant at the Church services at Valleyfield.
