HOBSON TELLS OF MENACE OF JAPAN

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4—A few thousand Democrats in San Francisco recently were firmly convinced that Japan is eagerly seeking war with the United States at an early date, and that only the presence of a big fleet in the Pacific will prevent conflict, after having listened to Congressman Richard P. Hobson, of Alabama.

Hobson was sailing along smoothly discussing the campaign issues, when a voice in the audience asked him to enlighten his hearers on naval affairs. The congressman, who is a member of the House Committee on naval affairs, readily complied. He asserted that Japan had borrowed more than a billion dollars to be used in a war with the United States.

—The second sale of the imported rams held at Summerside, this week under the direction of the Dept. of Agriculture was fairly well attended by the farmers of the surrounding country. There were eight rams sold prices ranging from \$5.50 to \$13.50 each.

—The marriage took place at the residence of Leonard Morris, Regina, Sask., on Oct. 24th, of his second son, Leonard Russel Morris to Miss Jessie L. Howatt of Summerside. Both the bride and groom are well known in Summerside where they formerly resided.

—A prominent insurance agent of Summerside, informs The Guardian that commencing with the first of this month a reduction is being made in the rate of premiums on fire insurance in Summerside. This reduction has been decided upon by the board of underwriters, in consequence of the installation of the Water Works system, and reorganization of the fire department. The reduction ranges from ten to twenty per cent, according to the location of the property, and applies to new insurance, and also to rewards after Nov. 1st.

Agricultural Fire Insurance was held in the office of the secretary at Summerside, yesterday morning. 173 applications for insurance were read and passed and the following losses ordered to be paid, Jesse W.
