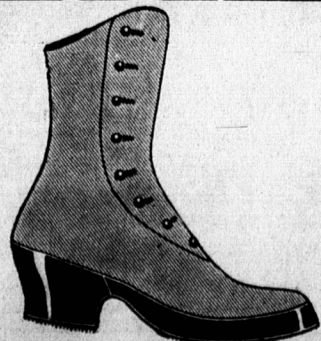

—EMERALD DAIRY CO.—A statement of the business done by the Emerald Dairy Co. during the cheese season ending on the 31st October, last, has been issued and placed in the hands of the patrons of that Association. The output was the largest for many years past, 197,643 lbs. of cheese having been manufactured. The quantity of milk received was 2,055,731 lbs. for which the patrons were paid an average price of \$1.11 per 100 lbs. A few of the largest patrons were: Ronald McDonald, 45,001 lbs. milk, value \$515.06; Mrs. John Hughes, 40,414 lbs., \$468.64; James McKay, 39,729 lbs., \$428.46; W. H. Mayne, 30,138 lbs., \$344.91; Emmet Hughes, 29,665 lbs., \$334.48; Jason McDonald, 31,234 lbs., \$351.06. A butter making outfit has been added to the plant during the past season and work along this line is still going on, a much larger quantity of milk being supplied than was anticipated.—E.
