Wives Are Scarce In Old Turkestan

Muslims Who Used to Have Nine Wives Now Have Trouble Getting One. SAMARKAND, Russian Turkestan, Jan. 11.—With the men of Turkestan outnumbering the women three to one, polygamy is fast disappearing and men who once had as many as nine wives are now having a hard time getting one.

The Sept. census, just completed, shows the great disproportion of men to women in Turkestan. Indeed there is a virtual famine of women, especially those of marriageable age, which the local officials believe can only be met by the importation of women from other parts of the Soviet Union.

Turkestan's 10,000,000 population decreased last year nearly 20 per cent, because of a sharp decline in the number of marriages and in the birthrate. The consequence of this is that the price of women and girls of marriageable age has increased from 500 to 5,000 rubles which is quite beyond the reach of the poor man.

For many years, which formerly was the rule throughout Turkestan, is fast disappearing. Before the Bolshevik revolution, rich landowners boasted up to nine consorts while the deceased Emir of Bokhara had 300 wives. Now the native Mohammedan has difficulty in purchasing and maintaining one wife.

Death As A Result Of Burns

Cheaper Nitrogen For N. E. Farmers

AMHERST, Mass., Jan. 10.—Cheaper fertilizer nitrogen ought to help New England farmers but may result in over production. This is the view expressed at the Massachusetts Agricultural College.

The steady increase in production of nitrogen in Germany, England, Japan and America is cited in a recent bulletin from the college as pointing to lower prices. Particular emphasis is laid on by-product nitrogen from America coke ovens and it is predicted that since ammonia must be salvaged from these ovens in the near future this will dominate the American fertilizer market and govern prices.

FRANK D. McCORMACK

There died at Halifax, N. S., on Sunday, December 26th, last at the comparatively early age of 36 years. Corporal Francis D. McCormack, Royal Can. Ord. Corps.

The deceased who was in the full flush of manhood was suddenly stricken by an attack of acute indigestion from which he never rallied.

Full military honors were accorded as the body of the deceased was escorted to the Railway Station, Halifax, for transport to his former home at Souris, P. E. The funeral cortege with its flag draped casket starting from his late home to St. Mary's Church followed by his immediate relatives and next by a representative delegation of returned men and a large number of mourners in the order named.

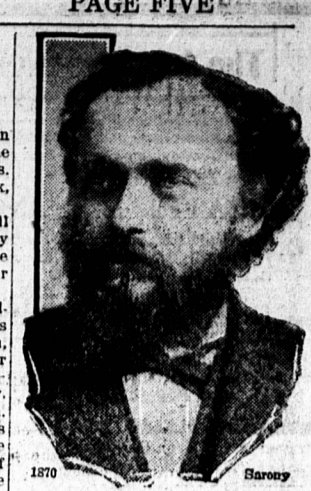

Penmanship Reform Needed In Toronto

GEORGE BRIGDEN IS OUT TO IMPROVE HANDWRITING IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS. TORONTO, Jan. 9.—Contending that the writing of Toronto public school graduates is terribly bad, Trustee George Brigden is out to work a reform in penmanship in Toronto schools. He has given notice of motion for the consideration of the appointment of a supervisor of writing.

"Why is it that the writing of Canadian children and older people, too, is infinitely inferior to that of the average old country school boy or girl?" asks Mr. Brigden. "That it is inferior is a well-known fact. The answer, I believe, is pure neglect. We are not training the children to write properly."

"I was talking to a prominent Toronto banker yesterday. He told me I was on the right line. He said the writing of the Canadian clerks is not comparable with that of the Scotch and English clerks in the banks."

"Business men are complaining of the kind of writing that is done in our schools and by the graduates of our schools. The present practice, I believe, is to give a little instruction in the first or second form and after that the child is allowed to drift. That accounts for the marvellous difference between the writing of old country children and that of Canadians."

"I know it will be said that there is not much need of writing in modern business—it is all stenography and typewriting. That is true to a large extent. But writing is an art, and we should not let it become a lost art. Why, I received a lot of letters at Christmas time, some of them from university graduates, and in many day if I had written like that I would have had a caning."
