By the passing of the late Donald MacEachern, whose death occurred at his home at Millview Tuesday, one of the best known and much respected residents of that section of country has gone to his eternal reward. He was well and favorably known, not only in the country but also in the city to which in his younger years he frequently came in on business. He was a blacksmith and carried on an industrious business for a lifetime. Notwithstanding a strenuous life, being a man who was always up and doing, he lived to the exceptionally advanced age of four score years and ten. He exemplified by his daily conduct his firm belief in those Christian principles which so strictly guided the men of integrity who have been called to their fathers.

The funeral took place yesterday afternoon, and all that was mortal of Donald MacEachern now rests in the Birchhill Cemetery.

engineer with the Commonwealth Edison Corporation, but was obliged to resign owing to ill health. He then went to British Columbia in the hope that his health would be restored by a change of climate, but unfortunately, his condition did not improve. Mr. Murchison received an appointment in the Civil Service at Ottawa, serving three years at the Dept. of Militia and Defence. About a year and a half ago he returned to Charlottetown, where he has since been an invalid, suffering with heart trouble. The death of his father last November, came as a great shock to him, and no doubt further seriously affected his health.

The late Mr. Murchison was a member of Zion church and of the Orange Order. He was a young man of splendid qualities of mind and heart, and true to the best tradition of his Scottish ancestors. His death while in the prime of manhood will be learned with deep regret by a wide circle of friends.

Besides his mother, he leaves a widow (nee Miss Winnie Blatch) and two young daughters, Helen aged eight and Katherine Margaret, aged six, three brothers, Rev. John M. Murchison of St. John, Secretary of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Bible Society, Rev.

Archibald J. G. Murchison, of St. Peters Bay, and Hector A. Murchison of Chicago, also one sister, Mrs. Willard Sencer, Charlottetown.

This is the third death which occurred in the family within the past eight months, his sister, Effie, wife of Donald A. McLeod, having died in Vancouver last July, and his father in Charlottetown on November 21st. To the bereaved relatives The Guardian extends sincere sympathy.

MRS. CLARA B. LIBBY

Funeral services for Mrs. Clara B. Libby were held on February 23rd at the home of her sister, Mrs. Franklin E. Low, 17 Bradshaw St., Medford, Mass. The Rev. Robert Watson, D. D. of the First Presbyterian Church of Boston, of which the deceased was a member, officiated. Officers of the Majestic Lodge of Rebekahs of Malden assisted in the services. She was laid to rest in Glenwood Cemetery, Everett, Mass. The deceased died in the Cambridge Hospital of apoplexy after four days' illness. Mrs. Libby was born in Sturtevant, P. E. I., 46 years ago and was the daughter of the late Frank Conrad and Catherine (MacPhee) Conrad of Georgetown, and who for many years resided at Sturtevant. After a serious ill-

A deep gloom was cast over St. Peters on January the 18th when Joseph McKenzie the oldest resident of that place passed to his Heavenly reward after a short illness at the advanced age of one hundred and two years. Deceased was a kind and loving father, and was much respected by his numerous friends.

Being a well known resident of St. Peters for many years he will be greatly missed by all who knew him, a kind and obliging neighbour, he endeared himself to all. During his illness he was frequently visited by his pastor, Rev. A. McAulay who administered to him the last rites of the Holy Catholic Church of which he was a devout member during his long life.
