Jellicoe Pays High Tribute To Canada

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 30—Canada may some day lead the British Empire, it was suggested yesterday by Earl Jellicoe, Admiral of the Fleet, at a directors luncheon of the Canadian National Exhibition, where many veterans of the Great War were assembled to hear him. "With a spirit like that of Canada, it will go far, declared the Earl. Geographically it is the centre of the Empire, and it will be more than that. One of these days—I don't like to say that of my own country, but I believe it is truth—Canada will be leading the Empire; and a country could have no greater destiny than that." A few places away from the Earl at the head table, Hon. Howard G. Ferguson, Canadian High Commissioner to Great Britain, smiled his approval.

AIRPORT IN READINESS FOR THE BIG PAGEANT

Yesterday afternoon the advance guard of the Trans-Canada Air Pageant arrived in the person of two Gipsy Moth planes, piloted by pilots Jones and O'Leary who made the trip from Moncton to Charlottetown in forty-five minutes and reported having encountered, tall winds and low lying clouds. WILL BE AT DAUGHTER'S BEDSIDE

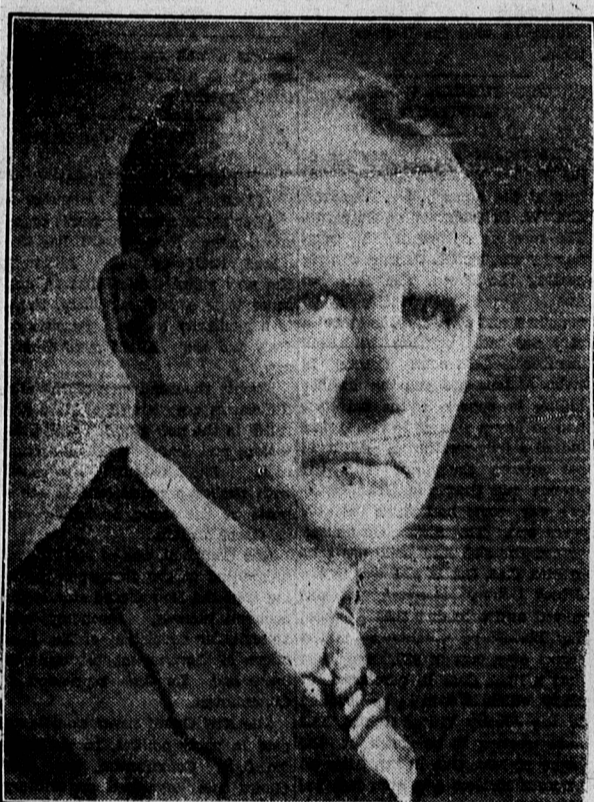

OPERATION SUCCESSFUL

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 30—Lady Gwendoline Jellicoe, eldest daughter of Admiral of the Fleet Earl Jellicoe, was operated on successfully at the Royal Victoria Hospital here today following an attack of intestinal obstruction. The illness of Lady Gwendoline developed during the voyage, with her parents and her brother, Viscount Brocas, from England to Montreal. Upon arrival here on Monday she was taken immediately to the hospital where she has been patient since that time. She appeared to be making favorable progress, so much so that Earl and Countess Jellicoe were able to fulfill engagements at Toronto and Niagara Falls.

Earl Jellicoe opened the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto on Friday. Lady Jellicoe presiding at the ceremony of inaugurating the exhibit of the National Council of Women the same day. While in Toronto Earl and Countess Jellicoe kept in touch constantly with the hospital and the physicians attending their daughter and were advised that an operation was deemed necessary. Lady Jellicoe returned immediately to Montreal this morning. Earl Jellicoe left Toronto tonight and will arrive here tomorrow morning.

Stewart and his colleagues receiving hearty congratulations. At a short meeting of the Cabinet held immediately after the public function, Hon. Mr. Sharp was appointed Acting Premier during the absence of Premier Stewart who will leave for Ottawa on Tuesday accompanied by Hon. Dr. MacMillan, to discuss unemployment plans with the Federal Government. Prior to his resignation on Saturday morning Hon. W. M. Lea was waited upon in his office by all the members of the staffs of the various departments and presented with a valuable club bag in token of the cordial relations which had existed between him and his donors. The presentation was made by Mr. H. R. Stewart, Clerk of the Executive Council. Brief remarks were made by Mr. Stewart and by Messrs. H. H. Shaw, Chief Superintendent of Education, and W. R. Shaw, of the Provincial Department of Agriculture. Hon. Mr. Lea, in acknowledging the presentation, warmly thanked all members of the staff for their loyal support and co-operation.

Man With Bullet Proof Skull Is Discovered

NEWTON, Kas., Aug. 30.—Four bullets which Sam Vinson, 47, fired into his head in a suicide attempt were removed by surgeon today. Instead of piercing the brain, the bullets flattened against his skull. Surgeons said the great amount of calcium in Vinson's bones contributed to the bullet-proof quality of his skull. His condition is not serious.

National Govt. Will Have 50 Majority

The new National Government will face Parliament with a standing majority of 50. Apart from their formal resolutions today's party meetings reveal how the House may be expected to line up. The Government seems likely to get less Labor support from the back benches than was expected. On the other hand there was no dissenting voice among the Conservatives who met today. The Liberals found only one dissenting voice, and that was not of a parliamentarian. The Government also expects it will have the support of six Independents in addition to three Liberal Independents, Sir John Simon, Sir Robert Hutchison and Ernest Brown, who recently broke from the main group of Lloyd George Liberals.

HALIFAX BANK ROBBERS STILL AT LARGE

HALIFAX, N. S., August 30—A fourth day of police vigilance apparently had brought the various arms of the law no closer tonight to apprehension of two men who on Thursday morning looted the Quinpool Road Royal Bank branch of \$16,000. Excitement was rife in the city today when it was learned that two motorists had been halted at Truro and sent back to Halifax for questioning yesterday, but tonight it was said they had been released and that no arrest had been made in the case.

Closing Session Mar. Baptists

WOLFEVILLE, N. S., August 30—"The new testament is the mother country of religious non-conformity," said Rev. Dr. W. N. Hutchin, of Acadia school of theology, addressing the closing devotional service of the Maritime United Baptist conference today. "It is the fountain of pure democracy and the living source of respect for personality. In the new testament are exhaustless springs of spiritual freedom. As Baptists we have always boasted that we were con-conformists, but if we are to continue to be such we must drink again and again from the living water of the new testament. Non-conformity is concerned with the moral life, and is the antithesis of worldliness, which is positive and practical disbelief of the supremacy of spiritual values. Non-conformity ideal is the life transformed."

American Farm Wife Loses Her Pin Money

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 29—Canadians have deprived the American farm wife of most of her pin money, according to figures provided by representative Cannon of Missouri in a statement issued through the democratic national committee. Until Canada put a ten cent duty per dozen on eggs, the Dominion was the best market in the world for United States eggs, according to Cannon. Formerly the tariff was three cents a dozen. In the first four months of last year under what Cannon described as a reasonable tariff, the United States exported 2,728,500 dozens of eggs to Canada, while in the same period this year the total shipment was only 17,968 dozen.

The Canadian National Exhibition

TORONTO, Aug. 29—The tramp of marching men and the blaring of martial music were the dominant notes in the programme of the Canadian National Exhibition today. The parade of ex service men and of militia and naval units and cadets provided the high light of the day, with Earl Jellicoe, Admiral of the Fleet at the reviewing stand and with him Sir Arthur Currie, who commanded the Canadian troops in the war; and significantly enough the day ended with a ceremony by the Shriner's in honor of the "Angel of Peace," whose arms stretch out in blessing over the exhibition grounds. The peace statue at the south of the grand plaza is to be illuminated at night by flood lights.
