SAYS MODERN MAN IS UGLIEST EVER

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, Sept. 17.—(C.P.)—A visiting educationist, M. Roussau, at a conference here declared men of to-day are about the ugliest they have ever been. He wanted the learned men before him to give 10 or 15 minutes of their day to physical exercises, best of all by themselves—under some pine tree commanding, perhaps, the most glorious view in the world as they greet the rising sun.

"I am no nature doctor, no physical culturist and no nudist, though I have done my daily dozen for years now, and I believe in their inclusion in our daily lives as a habit as essential to well-being as washing ourselves or clearing our teeth.

"Take a look at an average crowd of city workers pouring out from a railway station or to the city streets. There is hardly a good-looking, vital, alive man among them. But their worship is conducted along the wrong ideals. The rest do not know what it is to extend their bodies to tune them up to their full power and zest. They have never known the grace of which their bodies are capable. The slouch, the indifferent carriage, the hang-dog expression are the heritage of men too long now absorbed with the brain's development. That, and the drab, stereotyped clothing men confine their bodies in has helped to destroy the physical manhood of man. We can save it yet if we recapture the old ideals of these Greek athletes."

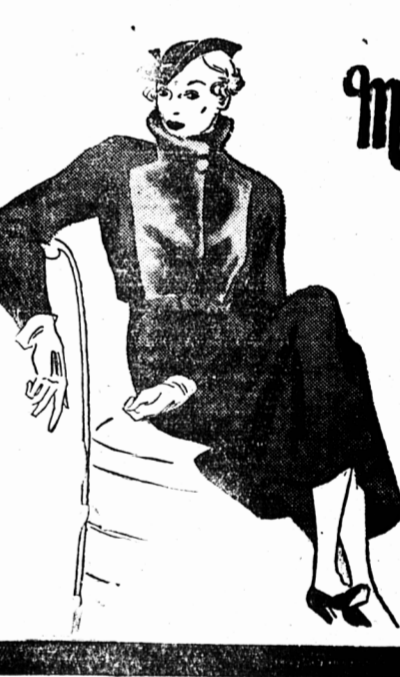

Convention At Souris

The local teachers' convention at Souris was well attended despite the unfavorable weather. The morning session opened at 10.30 with the President, Mr. Louis Gallant, presiding. The minutes of the previous local convention were read and adopted. This was followed by appointment of committees. After remarks by Mr. Gallant, Supervisor Murphy gave a very interesting talk regarding School Fair work. He stressed encouraging the pupils to do their best for the sake of the work itself instead of for the prizes offered. He also suggested that each teacher try to organize a Literary and Debating Society in his or her school.

Superintendent Hynes then gave an address in which he spoke of the advantages of the Carnegie Library to teacher and pupil, he also spoke of the time table and the qualifications of a teacher.

Following this addresses a paper "The Responsibilities of the Public School Teacher" was read by Miss Mary Lanigan.

Miss Catherine McLean then spoke in the interests of the Junior Red Cross and centralized Supervisor Murphy on the 100 per cent enrollment of schools in his inspection.

Mr. Gallant then called on Miss MacAulay, Supervisor of Hospitals, who gave a few words of advice to the young teachers, reminding them of the important task they had to perform in guiding young children. Mr. Gallant then expressed thanks on behalf of those present, to those who spoke during the morning session. The meeting then adjourned till 1.30 o'clock.

In Southern Spain, at Jerez De La Frontera, a coopers' strike developed this morning into a general strike, with the banners of Cadiz and San Francisco walking out in sympathy.

At Oviedo, Col. Abilio Bardabo, war ministry representative at the consoling of military industries was removed from office and replaced by the former Agrarian deputy, General Benjuni. The removal was linked to the recent seizure of a heavy quantity of munitions in Asturias.
