The Irving Oil Company, which has already erected a modern service station in Montague, are at present erecting a new office and storage plant. This plant is situated on the south side of the Montague River, and east of the bridge. This land was formerly owned by the government, but was bought by the Montague Town Council. It was then sold to the Irving Oil Company. The new building is to be erected of tile brick, and will be built one-storey high. The cement foundation has been reinforced with steel rods so as to support the great storage weight. Five huge tanks, each with a capacity of twenty thousand gallons, will soon be erected, adjacent to the main office. It is expected that the greater part of this construction will be completed within the next few months.

A new modern bakery is being erected adjacent to the Main Street in Montague, under the proprietorship of Mr. Louis MacDonald and Mr. Ronald MacDonald. The new bakery is twenty feet wide, thirty feet long with ten foot posts. The roof and brick siding have already been put in place, and the matched-board flooring is expected to arrive shortly. A gypcrete finish on the inside will complete the interior of the building. A large brick flue is to be built on the outside in order to conserve space in the interior. This modern bakery will include a large oven with a capacity of one hundred and forty loaves, thus giving a daily output of approximately five hundred loaves. A dough mixer, electric sealer, and storage racks are to be placed back of the main office which will occupy the front of the interior. Mr. MacDonald expects to have the bakery in operation within a few months, serving Montague and vicinity.

Mr. Claude MacLean, Montague, has had his land levelled off in preparation for the laying of a cement foundation for a new butcher shop to be situated on the north side of the bridge. This new business will provide a great convenience to the residents in this section.

ANCIENT PROPHECIES

There are in the Scriptures three sets of prophecies that have a reference to the "latter days"; and as one looks round at the bewildered state of the world and studies the perilous advances of science, it is difficult not to believe that we are heading for the great catastrophe to which they refer.

There are two or three circumstances which make the prophecies somewhat obscure, and, to some observers, reduce their credibility. Let us examine them.

First, all the Scriptural prophecies are translations, and some are translations of translations! When a word has half a dozen equivalents (all with different shades of meaning) in another language, the choice may make or mar the translation. Then again is the case with literal or figurative language? That is another pitfall into which the translator may stumble. The "young lions" of Ezekiel 38, 39, are translated by Coverdale as "worthies," a more understandable equivalent.

All the ancient prophecies are records of visions seen under pressure of bodily or spiritual excitement. As with dreams, not every incident of the vision would be remembered, and so would not be written down. This is also a cause of obscurity. And the last to be considered is, that the prophet as he looks down through the centuries, sees a host of new and unknown weapons to which he can only refer in terms of his own era.

The three ancient prophecies referred to are in Ezekiel, ch. 38, and 39; Daniel, ch. 11 and 12; and Revelation 13th is impressive in that it describes two nations, the first of which is so warlike that it is given power, for a brief space, over kindreds and tongues and nations. But "he that takes the sword," shall be slain with the sword," and so the first beast is vanquished. Then immediately a second beast (nation) arises with the same aim as the first, viz., to dominate the world—those who do not agree, are liquidated (v. 15). The nations dominated by this beast are not allowed to trade with outsiders (v. 16). Verse 17 has been in debate for centuries; who is 666? The old writers used letters instead of figures and it was not seldom that the scribe made an error in his letters. (They still do!) I have read somewhere of other numerals than 666 in this connection.

Chapter 14 tells of the downfall of the second beast (v. 9, 10) and the inauguration of a new dispensation (v. 1, 4, 5, 6). The lament for Babylon (ch. 18) is a duplication of ch. 14, v. 8, and the seven last plagues belong to that period too.

NEWSY NOTES

The Ruddy Duck is the last of our Sea Ducks and is said to be rare, in comparison with its status in the 19th century. Mr. J. Frank Sterns reported a pair at Basin Head, May 23, and June 6, 1937; and I myself saw a single Ruddy on Nov. 10, 1937, and another on Dec. 5, 1944. Here is a full description:

Ruddy Duck. AOU. 187. Migrant, rather rare now. Male is "the only duck that is largely red", top of head black, cheeks and chin white; throat, upper back and wings, rufous chestnut, lower back blackish; breast and belly silvery white. Bill short, broad, and of upturned appearance, in the breeding season it is a vivid blue. Tail feathers narrow, stiff, and pointed. In winter its cheeks are dull-colored and its back is mixed with gray. Female, a smaller bird; head with a dark cap, cheeks showing traces of white like the male; upper parts grayish brown, under parts whitish. Under surface of wings with a silvery sheen. Average length 15 inches.

This duck was almost exterminated before it was protected by the law. In the month of November 1905, a group of four hunters in one of the southern States, received \$1,700 for 2,300 Ruddy Ducks they shot and shipped. Such wholesale slaughter soon brought their numbers down and today only a limited number is to be found in that State.

More than 100 popular names have been applied to this duck. It is the Bumble-Bee Coot, from the sound of its wings, the Broad-bill Dipper, Bull-neck, Bristle-tail, Booby, and so on. The name "Booby" is used in the N. C. game laws.

Island Surnames: Nicholson
 The name Nicholson occurs twice in the census of 1798. Benjamin Nicholson resided in Lot 31, and

Dr. Nicholson in Charlottetown. The Doctor's Christian name is omitted. The original Clan name—Highland Scottish—was MacNicol but a part of the Clan, influenced by the Scandinavian element of the west coast, translated the name to Nicholson, and one more change gave us the modern spelling.

The region dominated by the Chief of the MacNicol was on the west coast of Sutherland, and a small section of Ross. In a description of the Parish of Assynt (lying near a Loch of Assynt name) it is said to have been a forest belonging to the ancient Thanes (or rulers) of Sutherland. One of these Prince Thanes gave it in vassalage to one MacKrycul, which meant that the giver expected to be repaid by military service.

In the year 1450, the MacNicol set up a M.S. genealogy of their Clan and claimed this MacKrycul as an ancestor under the name of Gregail. (Spelling was not static in those days!) The lands about Assynt at length passed to Torquill MacLeod by his marriage to the heiress, the last of that branch of the MacNicol.

After the marriage took place the whole of the Assynt MacNicol emigrated to the Island of Skye, where the MacLeods held extensive possessions. "The lands of Scorrybreck, near Portree were in possession of the MacNicol or Nicolsons for several centuries." One of their chiefs, the Rev. Donald Nicholson, was minister of Troternish for thirty years. An Episcopalian, he resigned in 1696, when Presbyterianism became the national religion. Norman Nicholson, the last chief of the Skye Clan, emigrated to Australia.
