ONTARIO AND QUEBEC.

The general election which has just taken place in Ontario and Quebec must be considered as a matter of very large importance not only to the two Provinces immediately concerned, but also as affecting the entire Dominion. For the two big Provinces contain nearly four millions of people, considerably more than half the population of Canada.

The Opposition gain in Quebec is not large, and seems not to have been more, if so much, as was generally expected. It leaves the Gouin Government still overwhelmingly supported in members, by at least three fourths of the new House. It is still too strong, either for the best good of the Liberal party there, or for the best good of the Province. What seems to have been generally expected was that both the Governments of Ontario and Quebec would lose a portion of their support, a loss which either one could well have afforded.

Taking the two Provinces together, and with the Ontario Legislature enlarged, there seems to have been a gain of twenty or more Conservative seats and a loss of ten Liberal seats. His majority is now far too large, it may be said, as in the case of the Quebec Government. Both the Whitney Government and the Gouin Government had fair records in their administration of public affairs and the elections have made it clear that the people desire to retain their services.

There is nothing in the result of the election in Quebec to indicate that Sir Wilfrid Laurier's power in that Province is broken. It must be remembered that Bourassa and Lavergne, who resigned from the House of Commons at different times to take part in the provincial campaign against Premier Gouin, both claim to be still independent supporters of the Liberal chieftain at Ottawa. What is, however noteworthy is that the English-speaking Provinces, all of which had Liberal Governments a few

years ago, have one by one been falling away to the Conservatives. British Columbia, Manitoba, Ontario and New Brunswick are in this list and seem disposed to stay there. If any more Provinces should fall away the tendency would be to isolate Sir Wilfrid and Mr. Fielding in those Provinces of Quebec and Nova Scotia which still remain so staunchly Liberal. Sir Wilfrid holds Quebec so solidly, in fact, that it is becoming something of a source of weakness in the larger English-speaking Canada outside.

It will take some days for the political situation to clear and settle. The Opposition at Ottawa will no doubt continue a vigorous warfare to the close of the session. That does not necessarily mean that the session will last very much longer. We do not think anything that has happened in Ontario and Quebec will deter Sir Wilfrid Laurier from making his appeal to the country this fall. The prospect of abundant crops in his favor. He met Wilfrid's challenge by advising that the Quebec elections be held on the same day, and as a result proved Quebec is a fairly good offset for Ontario. His strategy in this was good, but the voice of Ontario counts for some-

thing more in either the eastern or western Provinces than the voice of Quebec.

How largely the three Prairie Provinces were peopled from Ontario is shown by the fact that the majority in each of their Legislatures were born in the big Province by the lakes. Of Manitoba's House of 42, members 25 were born in Ontario, while 32 out of the 50 members in the two Legislatures of Saskatchewan and Alberta were also born in Ontario.

Bourassa's star has brightened for the moment, but whether the added brightness will be permanent remains to be determined. He defeated Premier Gouin in his stronghold, and appears to have divided St. Hyacinthe, which lies across the river from the big city. He produced more effect on the country and was more fortunate that the Conservative leader, Leblanc, who was defeated. The new Opposition in Quebec will be in point of talent and numbers more noteworthy than Conservative. It is noteworthy that Bourassa in the campaign posed as a strong admirer of British rule and British institutions. This was a point upon which some had been in doubt. There is danger that the plaudits of the multitude and his victory over the Premier in St. James may turn the young man's head.
