BUSINESS LEADERS CONFIDENT CANADA FEELING WAY OUT

Canadian, British, United States Conditions Cited In Halifax Interviews; Slow But Sure Advance Under Way Is Opinion Expressed As Session Opens.

HALIFAX, Sept. 13.—Very definite assertions that rock-bottom has been reached, and that the world in general and Canada in particular are feeling their way out of the economic slough in which they have mired for many months, were made as the opinions of five prominent men, three Canadians, an American and a Briton.

"The world has greater hope and more confidence," declared Right Honorable Viscount Ellbank, President of the British Federation of Chambers of Commerce. He was the Briton and like the other four, he arrived in Halifax to attend sessions of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce Convention which opened yesterday morning.

"There are very definite signs of a turn for the better, not only in this country, but also in Great Britain and in the United States," the eminent Englishman said. He declared that Canada had immense possibilities and that as business conditions improved, the Dominion would come into her own.

"Conditions generally are showing a gradual improvement, and it is better that such improvement should be slow and steady," said W. M. Birks, Montreal. He is president of Henry Birks and Sons, Ltd., and former president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce.

"The spirit of business is distinctly better," said Mr. Birks. He said he considered the upward trend in stock market prices during the past two months was evidence of the change in sentiment. The move was one indication of improvement, though perhaps not the most important. He thought signs of commercial activity in the United States were encouraging, he said.

"Undoubtedly improvement has started. The upward turn has started and will continue," was the brief but encouraging comment of W. Butterworth, Moline, Ill., official of the United States Chamber of Commerce.

"Business is certainly picking up, and that is an unmistakable sign of returning prosperity," said H. H. Bishop, Toronto, General Division Manager of the Mail Order Division of the Robert Simpson, Ltd. Mr. Bishop attributed the improvement to the increasing spirit of optimism in the West.

"There is a fine crop there, and the farmers are spending their money more freely," he said. "They are assured of a good income. Financial institutions are lenient with them. They are paying their taxes, purchasing necessities which they denied themselves so long, and even are paying off some of their indebtedness. Such a condition must lead to improvement in general business."

Business from the Maritime Provinces also was improving, Mr. Bishop said. He considered this was due not only to the better conditions in the West, but to the same spirit of hope and optimism which the Valley orchardists and the Nova Scotia lumber operators are feeling as a result of the Imperial Conference.
